WHOSE JOB WILL I FINISH.

No man ever really finishes his life work. It is impossible for any of us to do a perfect job, live as long as we may and work though we may to the limit of our strength. Always there will be something left when the sun goes down and the call comes to quit, says E. L. Vincent in Farm Life.

Now, there is nothing about this that ought to make us feel down in the mouth, and think that life is not worth living. For it is always possible for you and me to do a little something toward finishing up some other man's job, as well as pushing our own as far as we can.

It may be father is the man whose work we will take up and carry on further than he was able to press it before he went away. He made the old home just as beautiful as he could. He cut the fallow in the back lot; his hands logged the fallen trees and burned them; he pulled the stumps and built the barn and perhaps the new house. He did good, honest work and left the world better than he found it. A good, earnest, true farmer was your father and mine.

Now it is left for you and me to press father's task still further toward a perfect condition. We ought to be better farmers than he was. Don't you know it? He left us with the old place in good shape—we see the marks of his fingers on everything we touch. The fields are smoother for what he did; the fences are better than when he burned the stump fence and replaced it with rails or woven wire; the buildings are more convenient; but we, with out advantage, ought to make all these things better still.

And if we do this, that is all that will be expected of us. That, as a matter of fact, is our job, and upon the way we do it will depend the success we make of our lives. Father's job becomes our job. His dream, our dream. His longing to do the very best possible, our highest aspiration. And if this is so, we surely will be happy and reach the very best there is in life for us. Let's go right ahead, then, hopefully, courageously and like men. That is all that will ever be asked of us.

There will be no change of venue. The trial of Dr. Richard M. Brumfield will be carried out in this county, just as it should be. Judge Bingham was liberal in determining the date for the trial of the accused man, thus giving ample time for the assembling of evidence and witnesses in his behalf. Dr. Brumfield has excellent legal talent to defend him. His defense will be handled in a very able manner, and it is just and right he should be given every opportunity to establish his "lapse of memory" or insanity in that he is defense. The public recognizes this fact and it will be a satisfaction to all concerned, regardless of the ultimate outcome of the case, that both the defense and the state were ably represented in one of the most sensational and atrocious crimes ever recorded in this section of the state. The fate of Dr. Brumfield now rests with the twelve men sworn to render a verdict in accordance with the evidence presented. Let these twelve men weigh the bits of testimony presented in a fair, just and impartial manner. A grave responsibility is assigned to each of them. Much comment of the attorneys has been directed toward the editorials appearing in the News-Review regarding the defendant being required to prove his innocence. We should construe these articles technically, as no person charged with a crime is required by law to prove anything, but when such person hides behind a cloak which might imply that the defendant was justified in committing the act charged, this, of course, becomes an affirmative matter and must be established by such person beyond a reasonable doubt.

It is the common experience of the people who form chambers of commerce and like organizations, that many of these associations can not get their members to do any work. The organization service bureau of the United States Chamber of Commerce believes in meeting this difficulty by care in selecting committee-men and by giving them definite tasks. If you appoint a committee to cover a certain field in a general way, it frequently does nothing. The bureau urges that no committee be appointed unless it is given a certain definite task, to be performed within a reasonable time. Its duty is to investigate and report to the organization, which then shall accept the report and act on it, or turn it down. Committees should make "some definite proposition." No one should be named on a committee unless he has been consulted and has agreed to accept the appointment and do some active work.

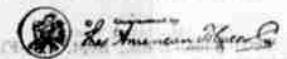

Dear Mrs. Ellsbury: Is it proper for a young man to ask "why" when I have declined his invitation to take me to a party, and is it necessary that I give specific reasons? After returning from a visit should I not write my late hostess immediately after my return and thank her for a very pleasant time even though I did so at my departure. Thanking you very much for these answers.

Ans. The fact that you have refused to go with him should be sufficient. If you do not care to explain and make no move to do so he should not ask you for reasons. If he does ask you you should not have to give specific reasons unless you care to. I would not write your late hostess at once upon returning. If you do so will think that you write for no other purpose than to thank her. Wait several days or a week, then write an informal friendly letter in which you again mention the good time that you had.

Dear Mrs. Ellsbury: In sending a story to an editor for publication should a note or letter accompany the manuscript? What should I say in case you have written to the editor before? Also is it proper for a girl of 18 to wear white organdie dress to a party in the winter time?

Is it proper to wear white pumps with a light silk dress to parties in the winter? What dress is appropriate for a public dance? Also for a school dance? Thanking you very much.

Ans. Yes, send a short letter with the manuscript. You need not say anything about the dress. If you are sending the manuscript, and thank him for any favor he may show you. If the dance is a dress up affair, and you are wearing the white organdie dress as a party dress it is correct in winter. Yes, it is proper to wear white pumps with a light silk dress to parties in winter. In speaking of the dress for a public dance it depends on what kind of a dance it is. If it is a public ball you would wear either an evening dress or a dressy dark gown. If the dance is merely a weekly public dance, any kind of a plain, attractive costume would be appropriate, a simple silk dress, a serge dress, or a suit. At your high school dance, be guided by what other girls will wear. In some high schools evening dress is worn to dances exclusively, and in others the girls effect the simpler mode of dark street dresses. You will always be safe if you find out what the other girls will wear.
