SMITH RIVER SCHOOL BUILT

New Union High School Built—Dedicated With Ceremonies Monday

A FINE IMPROVEMENT

Building Will Be Fine Addition to Lower Umpqua—Large Number of Pupils Enrolled for This Year's Work.

REEDSPORT, Sept. 11.—Another one of the Lower Umpqua country's most important episodes to be written in the annals of the history of Smith River Monday, September 12, 1931, when the new Union high school will be dedicated. Many speakers of well known reputation will be on hand to deliver addresses in accord with other ceremonies proper for such occasion. So far no definite persons have signified their willingness to be present but it is the hope of the school directors to have for their guests state and county superintendents.

The Union high school district No. 5, was recently organized and is comprised of the following school districts 41, 62, 88, 113, 138 and 163. A bond issue of \$20,000 was voted and contract let for the construction of a \$9,000 high school building.

The building site is on Smith River approximately 12 miles from Reedport on what is known as the William Koepke ranch and consists of five acres donated for this purpose by William Koepke.

The building which was completed last week, all except putting in what few benches that are needed, is one of the finest and most modern of its kind in Oregon.

The school proper is 160 feet long with blackboards running throughout the entire building. The blackboards are made of hard plaster with a specially prepared smooth surface.

The building is partitioned in three rooms with an eleven-foot hall that extends 110 feet through the building.

At the right of the main entrance is a door opening into one of the high school rooms. This room is 24 by 34 feet. Across one end of this room is a stage 14 by 24 feet. Between this and the adjoining high school room is a partition comprised of folding doors, making it possible to throw the two rooms together into an assembly room 24 by 25 feet, when occasion demands.

A modern steam heating plant has recently been installed by Paul Bernhardt.

The Union high school board of directors are as follows: Mrs. Beside Andrews, clerk; C. S. Benson, chairman; J. R. Butler, Noah Black, Mrs. Dave Roberts and H. T. Lewis, directors.

C. H. McKnight, for the past two years principal of the Roseburg high school, has accepted the principalship of the union high school. Mr. C. H. McKnight will have the honor of being the first principal in the new school building.

Two teachers will be engaged, of these one of whom will be Mrs. Helena Estudella. It is estimated that there will be about thirty pupils in the high school.

The forming of the Smith River high school will enable the graduates of the common school in that section to complete the full high school course near their homes and avoid the necessity of going abroad to some other high school for this purpose, which is a distinct advantage for the pupil and the parents.

MODELS SABER-TOOTH TIGER

Los Angeles Man Has Fashioned a Reproduction of Most Terrible Prehistoric Beast.

Gone from the earth before the contract was let for the Pyramids, the ferocious and all-devouring saber-toothed tiger that ruled the animal kingdom 200,000 years ago has no secrets from the scientists of today, and a Los Angeles man even has gone so far as to sculpture in concrete what he considers to be a perfect reproduction of the terrible monster with the sabered mouth.

The scientist, William Spaulding, has the sculptured piece in the workshop at his residence. He was president of the Southern California Academy of Science for four terms, and in that capacity he had occasion to learn as much about the saber-toothed tiger as men of today are permitted to know.

He was instrumental in opening the famous fossil beds at Brea, where the remains of the tigers were found in good enough preservation to reconstruct the skeletons.

From the relics of the skeletons, uncovered in the Brea pits, he has concluded that the tigers of 200,000 years ago were similar in size to the Bengals of today, differing essentially from them in their outstanding feature—the long saber teeth from which no enemy could be safe.

With the skeleton remains of the tigers sufficiently reproduced to outline the forms and physical characteristics of the tigers, Mr. Spaulding found little difficulty in making a likeness of the animal. In his art work he has reproduced the skeleton proportions and added the external characteristics of the cat family, whereby he believes a perfect copy has been accomplished of the fire-eyed feline demon that roamed supreme in the days before man was.—Los Angeles Express.

Flues Should be Inspected Now

That great care should be taken thoroughly clean out flues and move any rubbish which may be accumulated near them, is a warning issued by Fire Chief Fletcher. This time of the year the cold winds make a warm fire in the hearth very desirable and stoves have been out of use for the summer are being again brought into use. It often happens that during the time the stove is left idle and rubbish are allowed to accumulate unnoticed about the flues in such a position that they constitute a fire menace. Already one from this cause has been reported. Where a stovepipe runs into the ceiling flues with a shoulder or bend beneath it very frequently occurs that this forms a fire menace if it accumulates. Care should be taken. Chief Fletcher states, to have flues clean before the heavy fires are lighted.
