WINSTON VALLEY IS ONE OF THE FOREMOST PRUNE CENTERS IN STATE OREGON

Over 1,000,000 Pounds of Prunes Produced From This Section Each Year—Orchards Loaded With Purple Fruit This Season—Growers Will Receive Good Price.

The Winston valley is full of prunes. There is enough of the purple fruit being picked from the bending boughs in the Winston valley orchards this week to tickle the ribs of every cook in the army. Regiment upon regiment could line up in columns of fours and each and every man could receive a heaping mess-plate of prunes from the valley, and there would be enough fruit left on the trees to provide "seconds" for those who wished them.

The Winston valley resembles a huge prune in shape and at this time of the year the color is certainly there to add its bit of realism. Over one million pounds of prunes are produced in the Winston district each year. The time is past when the consumer sniffed at the idea of purchasing a prune for his breakfast. These one million pounds of fruit will be sold all over the United States and the large marketing companies in New York declare that the Oregon prune, and more especially the Umpqua valley prune is one of their best sellers. The price received by the growers this year is between nine and one-quarter and nine and one-half cents. By applying a few of the multiplication tables you can readily see that some shirkels will roll into the Winston valley when the season is completed.

What 50 Acres Will Do.
Fifty acres of land in Winston valley is equal to the classic little gold mine in the Klondike. One Winston fruit grower leaned back in his rocking chair the other day and in a few words proved that fact to the writer. From the 50 acres, the grower grossed \$75,000 in four years. Don't say, Mr. Salary Man, it really does seem impossible to us who spend our days chasing the elusive dollar through the highways and byways of the city. The grower went on to state that the orchard will gross him about \$50,000 in five years. This is based on a 50-acre orchard, 40 acres in Italian prunes and ten acres in Bartlett pears.

Entering the Valley.
The News-Review man, in company with Joe Murphy and W. C. Harding, made a flying trip through the valley today. The stem of the prune, granting that Winston valley is of prune-shape, extends down through Greens and hugs the highway for a distance of several miles. Here and there are little squares of orchards, mostly prunes. The Earl Agnes place consists of 30 acres, 10 acres in prunes just coming into bearing. M. C. Weatherford also has 30 acres, twelve of which are bearing the almighty fruit. Mr. Weatherford will pluck about 12,000 pounds of prunes from this orchard. J. J. Robinson, has ten acres, and a fine prune orchard that would be a meal ticket to any man. Fred Renner, who sticks type as a pastime in the News-Review office has 14 acres of fine pears, peaches and apples. Fred's orchards has yielded some great fruit this season, as can be attested by every member of the News-Review force. Miss Grace Lloyd, of Roseburg has ten acres adjoining the Renner place and it is a "peach" in every sense of the word. Will Austin has 18 acres in pears and M. M. Van Horn also has ten acres of commercial fruit. P. I. Klemeier has 20 acres in prunes, pears and apples, just opposite Sam Kelly's store. J. F. Rieth owns ten acres and his apples will insure a comfortable winter. The county fruit inspector, E. C. Armstrong, also resides along this stem, but the orchards in this valley are free from scab and disease and as a result Mr. Armstrong finds little field for endeavor here. Mrs. Claypool and her sons have a fine orchard in this district and W. D. Wolford has 25 acres in Bartlett pears. George Winston conducts a dandy orchard, and rumor has it that George is going to discard his faithful horse, "Old Dan" for a new and up-to-date flyer.

William Austin and son, who reside in the Green district, have about 50 acres of apples and pears, and as a side line they are doing a good business wholesaling and retailing flowering shrubs, pansies, chrysanthemums, etc. They contemplate building a hot house next season to better care for their increasing business. They ship ferns to the middle west, they state.

Frank Spaur spends his time shaking prunes and doing general farming. Henry Landers has 20 acres of fine stuff. In using "fine stuff" we refer primarily to prunes. His young orchard will yield 40,000 pounds this season. George Barnett owns eight acres of orchard land near the Winston bridge, and William Brosi has 20 acres of prunes. His orchards are located partly on a hill and on bottom land.

The prune land in Winston valley is valued at \$1000 per acre. That is not an exorbitant price for the prune yield from an acre will soon pay for the land.

Prune Trees Large.
Skirting the river is some of the finest prune orchards in the state of Oregon. This can be said without any reservations, for the growers declare that the trees in Douglas county grow larger and yield larger fruit than any other county. John Throne,

cashier of the Umpqua Valley bank, and O. G. Jennings, Southern Pacific engineer, own 20 acres of prunes in this section that are mighty hard to beat. The trees are mammoth in size and the fruit appears to rival an ostrich egg in size. The entire 20 acres consists of prunes, nothing but prunes.

Harry Winston, the well known fruit man of this section, has a prune production this season of about 100,000 pounds. He has purchased the crops of many growers in this district and has 24 dryer tunnels in operation this week. He has 40 acres of prunes, which he purchased from Dr. E. V. Hoover at a price of \$40,000. In addition to this vast acreage he has seven acres of cherries, 10 acres of pears and three or four acres of grapes. Harry hasn't "gone to seed" on prunes. He has 20 acres of broccoli, a side issue. To harvest this crop will require about three men to the acre. He is a firm believer in the future of the broccoli industry in Douglas county and has determined to make his 20 acres pay a good dividend.

Prunes, Prunes, Everywhere.
As one stands in the midst of the Winston valley he is surrounded by prunes of all sizes and descriptions. It is almost impossible to walk through an orchard without crushing prunes at every step. Writers and lecturers may rave about the Grand Canyon, the Yosemite and the Yellowstone, but if they could be transported to one of the Douglas county prune orchards at this time of the year and there see the pictures at work, they would realize that here nature and human beings have combined to turn out a scene that cannot be equalled.

Fred Winston is another prune man of the valley. He has 20 acres in prunes. Clay Smith is the possessor of a beautiful prune orchard consisting of 30 acres. Dr. George A. and Zella M. Bradburn have a fine 100-acre place in the valley. Their beautiful home is well surrounded by hundreds of pear and prune trees. They have 10 acres of three-year old Bartlett pear trees, 40 acres of thirty-year old prune trees and 20 acres of apples. In addition to this they have some cherries and about 5 acres of D'Anjou pears. L. B. Skinner and son have 50 acres of prunes and apples with a few peach trees. They raise wonderful fruit crops and their produce is marketed over the entire world. George Brosi has 20 acres of prunes. Bert Green has 25 acres all in orchard. Most of this is pears.

Other Fruit Grown.
The famous Winston valley is not only adapted to prunes but also to many other varieties of fruit, but there are only three heavy growers of commercial crops outside of prunes in this section. Dr. Bradburn has a wonderful pear crop. L. B. Skinner raises many apples and W. C. Harding has 20 acres of Bartlett pears.

Two of the finest pear orchards in the county are located in Winston. They are the property of Dr. Bradburn and W. C. Harding. These gentlemen would not take \$2000 per acre for their pear orchards. The orchards have grossed each of the men better than \$12,000 in the last two years.

All Modernly Equipped.
This district is known by the modern farm equipment to be found on every place. The beautiful homes of the fruit growers stand out as a mute evidence that very few crops have been reported as failures.

Dr. George Brosi has a 25-acre ranch with about 10 acres of prune trees in full bearing. He has about 10 acres of loquats which have proved to be a fine crop. John Winston has 12 acres in prunes and apples. Charles Hoffmeister has 10 acres of his 25-acre place in young apple and prune trees. The balance of the place is devoted to general farming. W. W. Chambers has 15 acres of peaches, apples and prunes, and H. P. Smith has 10 acres of apples. The trees are 12 years old. Martin Bruckner has 20 acres in prunes and on a hillside of his place he is raising some fine grapes. Joe Murphy is the owner of 22 acres of apples.

The prune dryers are in full operation in this district now and many owners are visiting the growers to see the plants in operation and to also get their fill of prunes.

W. C. Harding has 50 acres in the Winston valley, 25 acres of which is in fruit. He has 50 acres of 20-year old pear and prune orchard and 25 acres of 3 to 4-year old apples and pears. His place is equipped in a modern manner and his large crop of Italian prunes and petite prunes are being dried this week. The Bradburn and Harding holdings were formerly known as the Ben Agnes place. Ben Agnes was one of the first growers of fruit in the county.

Valuable to Roseburg.
With such sections as Winston tributary to Roseburg, the future prosperity of the county seems unquestioned. The vast sums of money realized each year from these fine orchards as well as the payrolls of many large cities. The fruit growing industry is only in its infancy, so state
