Commission Can Restrict Loans

SALEM, ORE., Sept. 21.—The state house commission has power to restrict loans under the bonus act to use in acquiring construction, establishing or completing a home or farm, according to an opinion written by Attorney General Van Winkle for Harry C. Brumbaugh, secretary to the committee.

The same opinion holds that service in the student army training corps can not be considered in computing service in the army, navy or marine corps to determine an ex-service man's eligibility under the bonus act.

State Fair Program To be Best Ever

SALEM, ORE., Sept. 21.—(Special)—All is practically in readiness for what promises to be the greatest state fair in the history of Oregon.

Outstanding features of the fair this year will be livestock and agricultural exhibits from the display point of view, and from the entertainment side, horse and auto races, airplane stunts, night horse shows, auto polo, fireworks, balloon ascensions, with the latest novelty added in the way of horse racing in the evening.

The various days have been scheduled as follows: Monday, children's day; Tuesday, Boosters' Day; Wednesday, Salem Day; Thursday, Portland and D. A. R. Day; Friday is Elks' day; G. A. R., W. R. C., Fraternal and Willamette Valley Day, with Saturday being turned over to the Shriners of the state.

Auto races will be programmed for the first three days of the fair, with the fastest drivers in the northwest competing for the \$1500 cash prizes. Auto polo, airplane stunts, balloon ascensions and fire drills by expert firemen, will be daily attractions, with the regular racing program including the best bets of the Northwest.
