Coming to Oregon With Ox Team

FREDERICK, MD., Sept. 22.—Prosperous, but with an innate aversion for the automobile which his New England stubbornness will not permit him to forget, J. C. Berrang, living near West Chester, Connecticut, 60 years old, and his white-haired wife are migrating to the west in search of further fortune, as the pioneers of 60 years ago did. They are travelling in an ox-driven wagon. They don't anticipate reaching the "promised land" until late in 1922.

Already Berrang and his wife have been on the road nearly a year. They left their Connecticut farm December 2, 1920, and their destination is the fruit belt of Oregon. The procession is quaint. The "wagon train" is headed by two huge oxen, drawing a canvas-covered wagon with bulging bows. This is followed by a more modest outfit—a cart drawn by an ox. They make ten miles a day. They have no speed records to break. Mrs. Berrang, white haired, who shares this adventurous spirit of her husband, has walked beside the unique train the greater part of the distance from Connecticut.

Berrang is unable to account for his great desire for adventure in the late days of life. He has just put around the farm. He confesses that to him his trip is his "gold strike of '49." That rush for gold nearly three-quarters of a century ago has always had glamour for him. Now he's off to search for another kind of gold.

In Ohio, Berrang will switch off to the Lincoln highway. In winter he will be headed for the South, and in spring he'll turn north, and then the final lap—to Oregon and to his apple orchard.

FISH STEW EXCELLENT DISH

Home Demonstration Agents of the Department of Agriculture Recommend It Highly.

The "pine bark fish stew," which is being marketed by the canning clubs in the southern states along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, should be of interest to housewives, says the New York Times. The development of combination foods peculiar to certain localities has been particularly fostered by extension agents of the United States Department of Agriculture and the state agricultural colleges which carry on boys' and girls' club work. Almost every country in the world and practically every district in the United States, has a special "one-piece" dish made of the products in that region. The gumbo of the far South, the New England boiled dinner, the bouillabaisse of Marseilles reproduced in New Orleans, Hungarian goulash, Chinese chop suey, Indian curry, Irish stew, French ragout, are instances of this tendency to blend flavors in one dish.

Pine bark fish stew is a characteristic dish in South Carolina. Very probably it was introduced by settlers from the southern part of France and from Italy. Italians living in southern California serve a similar fish stew. The home demonstration agents, seeking a popular and somewhat novel product which would not be in competition with commercial canned goods, decided to have the clubs make a specialty of canning pine bark fish stew.

Onion, tomatoes, celery, pimiento and fish are the ingredients, which are cooked slowly in vegetable oil and poured over "southern style" rice. At large out-of-doors gatherings and community lunches this is served on pieces of pine bark, giving the dish its name. In Florida, Georgia and all the Gulf states various local fish are adapted to the combination.

Law May Compel Obedience to Oath

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—An appeal to congress to enact a law to compel city officials to obey their oaths of office in enforcing the 18th amendment has been made in the form of a resolution passed by the Chicago Law and Order league with assurance that it will be brought up in Congress during the next few days. The resolution, after asserting that while Mayor Thompson of this city has announced that all of his appointees have been instructed to enforce the law, states that there are not less than 2,500 "dry bars" in the city of Chicago where intoxicating liquor is sold "and the principal offenders in permitting this situation to continue are the Mayor of Chicago and the General Superintendent of Police."

The resolution states that Chief of Police Fitzmorris of Chicago stated before witnesses that "as long as the government allows intoxicating liquor to be shipped into Chicago, I will not mop it up."

Searching For Ancient Bell

HONOLULU, T. H., Sept. 21.—Search for a bell that once warned mariners of a dangerous shoal off the coast of California but broke loose from its buoy and, current-swept, blithely caroll its way for 2,000 miles along the Pacific until it came to rest years ago on the shores of Oahu island, has been started by Judge Sanford B. Dole, former president of the Republic of Hawaii and later first governor of the territory. The bell, if found, will be placed among the chimes at a Riverside, where bells from many other parts of the United States have been hung in honor of the padres who built the first missions in California, Judge Dole said.

After coming to rest, on the shores of Oahu, the bell was salvaged and placed on one of the Hamalan coast buoys, being replaced later by an electrically-operated light-house. The bell disappeared but Judge Dole hopes to find it and send it to Riverside as Hawaii's contribution.

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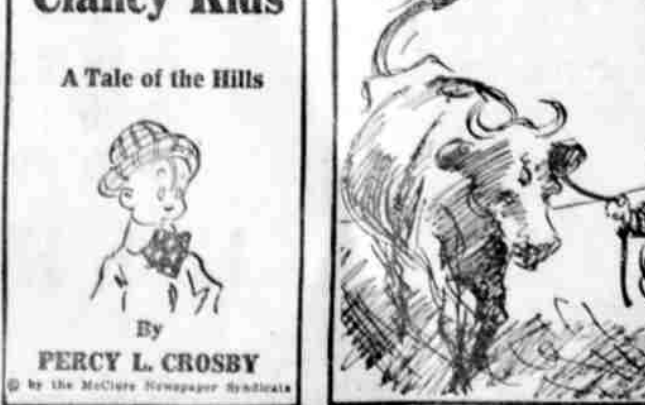
