Railroad Reduces Rates on Prunes

Rates on shipments of dried prunes for assembly and packing have been granted by the Southern Pacific. The new schedule will apply to all points in Oregon on the S. P. lines and will be nearly a 50 per cent reduction over the old tariff. This concession was brought about through the efforts of C. L. Smith, traffic manager of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association, and the benefit will be general to all packers in the state.

Special rates on fruit shipments to Seattle and nearby points have also been obtained through the efforts of the association. These will apply to several shipping points in the Willamette valley, and will mean a saving of about 10 percent on all shipments from the points designated.

Military Funeral Held in Gardiner

GARDINER, Sept. 19.—(Special to the News-Review).—The burial of John M. Pyritz, of Gardiner, who was killed in action in France, was held Sunday under the auspices of the American Legion, Reedsport Post No. 62. Rev. Lamb of Reedsport read the burial service.

John M. Pyritz, the only son of August Pyritz, was born May 16, 1892, in Gardiner. After graduating from the Gardiner schools he continued his studies in California, taking up the study of automobile mechanism and electricity. He entered the service June 22, 1918, leaving Gardiner at that date for Camp Lewis, where he spent three weeks. From there he was transferred to Camp Kearney, Cal., and after two weeks was ordered overseas. On September 22, 1918, he was transferred to Co. M, 205 Infantry, 77 Division, and four days later went into battle in the Argonne region. According to a message sent to his father by Harry Buckner, a soldier comrade, he was shot from a tree while doing duty as a sharpshooter, on October 13, 1918.
