Outsider Gives His Impression of Brumfield

Robert Kuhl, editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, who spent thirty minutes at the Brumfield trial on the opening day has written his impression of the prisoner as follows:

Dr. R. M. Brumfield doesn't look the part. As he entered the court room at Roseburg yesterday a stranger would never have picked him for the defendant. Cleanly shaven, immaculately dressed, he walked unaccompanied by deputies, court attaches and newspaper men and was easily the most distinguished looking person in the group. He was also the most self-possessed. And yet there was no studied indifference about him. Not the slightest suggestion of bravado, or any self-consciousness whatever. One felt that he was merely himself—and self-control, linked with a quiet but decided self-esteem, was his most distinctive note.

Brumfield is much better looking than his pictures. He might be a prosperous business man, keen and alert, a successful automobile salesman, dealing only in high priced cars, a metropolitan professional man of prestige and standing or even a pugilistic idol like the Greek god Carpentier, equally at home handing out knockouts to roughnecks, or tea and lettuce sandwiches to debutantes but never as the star in a backwoods murder, shooting an unkempt recluse in the back, pulling out his teeth, blowing of his head with dynamite on the chance of picking up a few thousand dollars in insurance money.

Not that the man looks incapable of violence. He fairly breathes physical stamina and power. But there is that dominant note of self-control, and self-esteem. One actually feels the man's own sense of superiority. To associate him with murder therefore destroys his atmosphere entirely, for murder requires a certain amount of abandon. Moreover it isn't done in that social circle where the Roseburg dentist appears to belong. He looks and acts the part of a gentleman whose perfect manners are the source of his greatest personal pride.

And his eyes—those highly advertised piercing orbs. They are very black but alert rather than piercing, and intelligent rather than wild. No, the doctor doesn't even look the maniac.

So it is not surprising that the people of Roseburg who knew this man for ten or twelve years, as an alto-rather superior person, a leader in the arts and the unlike, should be thrown into complete emotional confusion by this altogether incongruous and impossible development. They are all nerved, not convinced of his guilt and anxious apparently to see

him hung, and yet the old fascination of the Brumfield figure—one is inclined to suggest Brumfield figure—still endures and the situation suggests all sorts of possibilities before the final scene is over.

There was a slight delay in the march from the jail to the court house. A crowd of people gathered around, young and old, all curious to get a view of this notorious criminal. One felt the awkwardness of the situation. But not the doctor. He appeared perfectly at ease. He was serious, dignified, calm, a man one felt in perfect control of himself and the situation, and just a trifle contemptuous of the curiosity seekers on one hand and the somewhat embarrassed deputies on the other.

He took a seat with his lawyers and his back to the spectators, back straight with arms folded facing the judge. When his wife entered he arose, quite naturally, as if it were his habit whenever a lady entered the room. Mrs. Brumfield lacks the distinction of her husband and in no sense approaches his smart, clear-cut type. She looks "nice," motherly, competent—one dismisses the idea of her as an accomplice, just as one dismisses the idea of the doctor as a murderer but for different reasons. The doctor is too fastidious, the too normal. No, a dramatist would never have cast these two people for the parts they have apparently played. The show would never have got over.

Mrs. Brumfield greeted her husband with a smile, a sad smile, and yet a friendly one, and patted him on his shoulder as she passed by, very much as a mother might pat one of her boys, who was in temporary trouble—no sob stuff suggestion—just a friendly tap, to let him know she was there and with him.

So much for appearances after thirty minutes in the Roseburg court room. A longer stay, a closer view of the principal characters might lead to an entirely different judgment. But no one can question that this case is one of the most picturesque and unusual cases in the history of Oregon crime. And while the crime has practically been admitted, and insanity is now the only defense, mystery still surrounds the entire proceeding. Twenty-four hours away it is still impossible somehow to see a hemp noose replace that perfect fitting collar, and this man who has obviously been the pride of some tailor or who is an artist, become the fortune-teller of an inartistic hangman. One can see Brumfield shot in a daring attempt to escape, one can see him plunge to any dramatic doom, in which he played the stellar role, but one can't see him decorate the gibbet. But that seems to be

his destiny. The only conclusion is that appearances count for nothing, and that a master dramatist had nothing to do with selecting the cast of the famous Brumfield trial.
