Governor Will Not Save Slayers

SALEM, Oct. 14.—Governor Olcott will not intervene his executive powers to save either John L. Rathle or James Owen from death on the gallows for their part in the murder of Sheriff Til Taylor of Umatilla county in the course of a jail delivery at Pendleton in July, 1920.

He made this plain in a letter to J. Wealey Holden, Idaho Falls, Idaho, attorney, who had written the governor in an effort to obtain executive clemency for Rathle.

"If one familiarizes himself with the record at the trial of these men; if he analyzes the testimony not only given against them but by the very defendants, speaking for their lives in their own behalf, it is difficult to see how one can avoid the final conclusion that both of these men were equally responsible with the man of poorly endowed mentality, Neil Hart, who already has paid the penalty for the killing of one of Oregon's finest citizens," the governor writes.

"It would be a distinct relief to me if evidence arose which would show these men to be innocent of the crime with which they are charged. But my conscience cannot permit me to relieve them of the legal penalty for a crime, the guilt of which unquestionably rests upon both of them," his letter concludes. "It was in Rathle's cell, on Rathle's bunk, that the plot was hatched which resulted in the death of Sheriff Til Taylor," the governor continues, in commenting upon the circumstances surrounding the crime for which Rathle and Owen are sentenced to be hanged. "On Rathle's own admission it was he who was to strike the first blow at the jailer; it was he who did strike the first blow, who held the arms of the jailer pinned while his accomplices bound him and made him helpless.

"On Rathle's own admission in the grand jury room, testified to by men of veracity and standing, selected to serve as grand jurors, the whole plot was based upon a desperate decision to escape from jail, and not to stop at murder, if necessary, as Rathle specifically, in his own statement to the grand jury, as proven by the same competent testimony I have cited, agreed to the plan to shoot their way out."

RED CROSS WORKING FOR HEALTHIER U. S.

Thousands Aided by Instruction In Care of the Sick, Food Selection and First Aid.

How the American Red Cross guides thousands of persons to health is shown in a summary of the society's activities in the health field based upon the annual report for the last fiscal year. Through its Nursing Service, its Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick courses, nutrition classes, First Aid classes, Life-Saving classes and Health Centers and in numerous other ways designed to acquaint masses of citizens with proper methods of living, the Red Cross carried its message of health into all parts of the country.

The work of the Red Cross during the war in its traditional field of nursing, furnishing the military and naval establishments of the nation with 19,877 nurses, is well known. And there are today 37,757 nurses registered with the American Red Cross and subject to call in emergency. During the fiscal year, 1,551 Red Cross nurses were accepted for assignment to Government service, 388 by the Army and Navy and 1,163 by the United States Public Health Service.

In addition to the nurses enrolled by the Red Cross for Government service, the Red Cross itself employed a total of 1,348 public health nurses in the United States and Europe. By far the greatest number was employed in the United States, 1,257, while 91 were in foreign service.

Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick classes, giving thorough instruction in the proper care of the sick in instances where the illness is not so serious as to require professional nursing care, during the fiscal year numbered 5,170. A statistical picture of the Red Cross operations in this field follows:

New classes formed during year..... 5,170
Classes completed during year..... 6,290
New students enrolled..... 101,098
Students completing course..... 73,432

What the Red Cross accomplished in giving proper instruction through its Nutrition Service is indicated by the following table:
New classes formed during year..... 142
Classes completed during year..... 190
New students enrolled..... 2,341
Students completing course..... 2,013

In addition to the above, a total of 22,000 children were given instruction in the proper selection and preparation of foods.

Through its 260 Health Centers, the Red Cross reached 90,252 persons. In these Health Centers, 4,015 health lectures were given and 780 health exhibits held.

In the United States last year, 75,432 persons were killed and 3,500,000 injured in industrial accidents. To prevent this enormous waste the Red Cross held 5,100 first aid classes with a total of 101,098 students enrolled.
