STUDENTS PAY LOANS

CORVALLIS, Oct. 19.—Demand for loans for college students has been heavy this season due to economic conditions. In the first nine days of September after registration, 27 students obtained loans from the college loan fund. The loans averaged \$96 a student. Practically all of the \$17,189 in the fund is now outstanding. It is the hope of the committee that additional gifts will

be made this year. The amount loaned thus far this year is \$2,508. Application for more than \$1000 is now under consideration. The total of loans made in the ten years since the organization of the fund is \$46,165. The fund was started in 1911 with a nucleus of \$500. The amount of money lost through failure on the part of the students to return the money borrowed has been practically nothing.
