PLANT DISEASES TAKE HUGE TOLL

Farmer Suffers Loss of Income and Consumer Compelled to Pay Higher Prices.

CONTROL OF PESTS IS URGED

Can Be Brought About Only Through Meticulous Technical Research, Followed by Adoption of Remedies by Farmers.

When a plant disease or some other crop pest destroys an important crop throughout a large area, it is easy to see how dangerous these pests are both to agriculture and to the country.

Take Heavy Toll on Crops. But spectacular and widespread destruction of crops is by no means the only harm worked by plant diseases.

It has been difficult to determine even approximately the amount of damage done by plant diseases, but very careful estimates recently made by the pathologists of the state experiment stations and the Department of Agriculture indicate that in 1919 the production of ten of the important cereal, fruit and vegetable crops was reduced more than 650,000,000 bushels by plant diseases.

When it is remembered that substantially equal expenditures for labor and other items up to the point of harvest are required for the diseased and the healthy crops, it is clear that these pests constitute a most grievous and dangerous overload on agriculture, our basic industry.

Must Aid Stabilization. Japanese Talk Arms Limitation

TOKIO, Oct. 21.—The forthcoming conference at Washington is a fruitful topic of discussion with magazine writers, and a considerable part of the current issue of the Talkwan (Outlook) is devoted to a consideration of the subject from various points of view.

This limitation, he declares, is now a universal demand, arising not so much from a desire to lighten the financial burdens as from a fervent wish to avert the horrors of war.

The world's first need today, he says, is an effective instrument to prevent war or rather to guarantee peace, because with the establishment of peace naturally comes disarmament.

Sneeze Weed Is Poison to Sheep

A plant poisonous to sheep on the ranges, and for which no practical method has been discovered for eradication or for cure of the resulting disease, is described in a recent bulletin of the United States department of agriculture.

It was first reported to the department in 1903 that a mysterious disease, characterized by vomiting, wasting away, and death, was attacking sheep in Utah.

The weed is a strong perennial, growing to a height of 1 to 3 feet, with one or several stems. The plant when young is often hairy or woolly, particularly the stems.
