Gregory of the U. of O.; Professor J. S. Landers, President of the Oregon Normal; Professor E. D. Bender, Dean of Industrial Education at O. A. C.; J. E. Callahan, Field Work State Educational Department; H. C. Seymour, Leader of the Boys' and Girls' Club; Dr. Fry Clark, President of the Pacific University; Mrs. Stella Inghel of La Grande and Elizabeth Hopper, health crusade director of Portland.

The teachers of the Roseburg High School will entertain the outside teachers at a luncheon. Every teacher in the county is urged to attend this Institute, as it will undoubtedly be the best one ever held in Roseburg.

As she did this she spelled the word, w-a-t-e-r, through a sort of megaphone. Water was the first word she learned the meaning of.

After she was quite a bit older she attended Radcliffe College and finished it.

As she grew older she could feel other people's lips move, so she began to move her lips, and after a time she could say a few words, although she could not say one sentence after another like we can. She regained some of her hearing after some time.

ROSE SCHOOL
A scheme has been worked out under the direction of Miss Henderson, Miss Hatheway, and Miss Clune for the pupils in English and reading making it compulsory for each pupil in the department to read one book each semester and to read three books for outside reading each semester.

The recitation must consist of at least 300 words and may be either poetry or prose. It must be delivered before some gathering—class, Parent-Teachers meeting, etc.—in a creditable manner.

After reading the books the pupils must report on them in class giving the author, title, publisher, classify the book—novels, story of adventure, etc.; characterize them as humorous, pathetic, thrilling, dry; name the characters; where the scene is laid, etc.

A certain portion of the child's English and reading grade is given for this work.

HOT WEATHER GOOD THINGS.

A good supply of bottled sirups, juices and ginger ale will be a source of comfort and refreshment to the housewife and guest during the hot weather.

Cherry Punch.—Boil together for five minutes two cups of sugar and four cups of water; add one cup of lemon juice, three cups each of orange juice and cherry juice. Chill and serve with ice.

Grape Nectar.—Boil together one cup of sugar and one quart of water; after cooking ten minutes add when cool the juice of three lemons, two oranges, one can of pineapple and a pint of grape juice. Let stand three hours then add one thinly-sliced orange. Serve with ice.

Ginger Ale.—Remove the skins from six large lemons and slice them into an earthen bowl. Add to them six ounces of bruised, fresh ginger root, six cups of sugar and four gallons of boiling water. When lukewarm add one-fourth of a yeast cake dissolved in a little water. Cover the bowl with a thin cloth and let stand a day. Bottle and keep in a cool place.

Pear Fritters.—Cut ripe pears, peeled and cored into thick slices; dip into a fritter batter and fry in deep fat. Serve rolled in sugar and with a sauce made from stewing the peelings and cores, with a pear or two in sufficient water to cover. Strain, sweeten, thicken with flour; add butter; cook until smooth and thick. The fritter batter is prepared with one cup of flour, the yolks of two eggs, one-half cup of cold water, two tablespoons of sugar and a tablespoon of olive oil or any good salad oil. Beat to a smooth paste; add the stiff-beaten whites and a pinch of salt.

A pair of baking sheets made to fit the oven with the edges turned up and reinforced by a piece of heavy wire are the handiest of baking pans. A whole roll of cookies may be rolled out and baked with one heating of the oven.
