ALFALFA FAILURES MANY

The Willamette Valley acreage in alfalfa is steadily increasing. There have been many failures with this crop during past seasons, partly because of planting on soils not suited to alfalfa—in many cases because the wrong variety was used and in some instances because of disease. Alfalfa is only suited to the sandy mellow, well drained soils. Grimm is the best variety and for the Willamette valley it is best if the alfalfa is clipped or cut for hay late in the season so that it does not go into the winter with a heavy green top growth. This makes a particularly valuable place for the development of stem rot. Alfalfa and clover respond to spring applications of land plaster at about 100 pounds per acre.

SOIL ANALYSIS NOT FEASIBLE

Samples of Oregon soils taken ac cording to directions will be examin-ed and if possible identified as to type, but it is not feasible to make mplete analysis of the many samples taken irregularly and sent to the state college experiment station. Soil surveys are being made as rapid ly as possible including physical and chemical analysis of the various types, which are tested for fertilizer needs and methods of management it is thus impossible to analyze the many miscellaneous samples sent in.
