CAMP SITES DONATED

J. H. Booth today donated to the State Highway commission, the tract of land consisting of twenty acres, lying along the Pacific highway from the VanDyne bridge near the Booth ranch to a point approximately one mile south. This land which borders the river bank, is an ideal park and camp site and will be improved by the commission. Two other donations were made, according to telegraph dispatches, eight acres at Romona Dell on the Columbia highway being given by Mark A. Meyers and a large tract at Rosas River Falls, by Henry Walther of the California and Oregon Power company.

Says Apple Price Will be Better

"People are constantly asking how the apple market looks," says C. A. Brand of Overland Orchards. "The last reports I remember seeing in the Roseburg papers were quite rosy and would lead the growers to expect prices hanging around \$2.00 to \$2.25 for extra fancy Spitzburgs. I am a grower and not a marketing expert and do not want to be disappointed, consequently put my expectations low. Personally I do not believe that prices are going to run high this year, at least not till later when storage charges will have piled up to some extent to add to costs.

"Conditions are not what we thought they were going to be early in the season when the long crop here and the short crop in the east were all that most growers could see. Another feature which has to be reckoned with is the amount of money that the public has to spend for apples. It is true that there is a short crop in the east, but in that connection note the following letter from a correspondent in Iowa, and he represents the conditions in more states than one. He says:

"We feel that territory in Iowa and neighboring states is probably at a lower range of buying power than a great many other states because we are largely agricultural in our pursuits in Iowa, and the farmer has been hit terrifically in price reductions on his products. Oats are selling at from 11 cents to 15 cents per bushel, and corn around 20 cents to 25 cents per bushel, and you can imagine when a farmer has to bring in about 40 bushels of oats to buy one box of extra fancy apples, or 15 bushels of corn, that it is certainly going to go against his disposition very vigorously. There is quite a speculation in the minds of our jobbers here as to how great an extent our farmers in Iowa are going to stand for this wide disparity between the value of the commodities they produce and the value of the commodities produced in your orchard districts.

"In the long run the market value is all the grower will get for his apples and no one organization or fruit district can fix the price. We are not abating at all at present and are storing dozens of cars in our warehouse here. One can sell now if he wants to take the market price which is low. Our hunch is that the market is going to be better, and with railroad conditions as they are we are satisfied to hold everything here. Of course only time can tell whether or not we have guessed right."
