BLIND SOLDIERS OF FRANCE ARE IN WANT.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—(United Press.)—France counts among her war heroes 2500 veterans who will never see the light of day again, they are totally blind.

The French army was not equipped at the outset of the war with the protective devices known to the American army when it took the field, and her soldiers paid valiantly the price of a bitter experience. The majority of the blind were victims of gas attacks at the time when the gas mask had not yet come into being. Of the 2500 blind, scarcely 100 have enough to live on. They have received government training in various trades, but practice has proven the fallacy of the theory current during the war that the blind would be able to earn their living. The French pension law only allots 3000 francs a year to those blinded in the war. They are not classed as "severely wounded," the latter drawing 6000 francs a year. Both these sums are insufficient to care for those who have sacrificed the best of their life, and a movement is now on foot in the senate to revise war pensions.

ASKED TO AID JOBLESS

SALEM, Oct. 27.—The school children of Oregon were today called upon to give their aid in the solution of the nation's unemployment problem. J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, in letters addressed to the school officials throughout the state, calls attention to the fact that Herbert C. Hoover, chairman of the federal unemployment conference, has asked the national education associations to rally the school forces of the nation back of the movement to find odd jobs for the three and a half million unemployed.

In addition to giving special study to local conditions the schools are asked to give publicity to the proposed remedies for the present emergency and to include in courses of study provisions for consideration of unemployment as a permanent problem. Emergency measures will include a general "spruce up" campaign in which all people of the nation will be asked to find the odd jobs which can as well be done now as later.

The special task of the school children will be to direct attention of the people generally to the unemployment situation.

NATIONAL APPLE DAY

Monday, October 31st is Halloween day. This is the big day for it is the day which will be observed from Seattle to San Diego, and from Portland to New York as National Apple Day.

Last year's observation of the day and the week devoted to giving publicity to the apple and according to an official of the International Apple Shippers Association which is sponsoring the movement there is no question but that the wide-spread publicity given to the apple was one of the prime factors underlying the continued strong demand for this fruit throughout the year. It assisted in moving the largest apple crop on record.

It is expected that every city and community in the northwest will be interested in giving the apple the top place in the day which will be observed through the entire country. This day was observed by the larger cities in all sections of the country last year and it is expected that the apple will receive even wider publicity this year.

COLLEGE TAKES UP POLO

CORVALLIS, Oct. 28.—Polo is the latest sport to be played at the Oregon Agricultural College here. Students recently took up the game under direction of United States army officers quartered here.

Beginners are given practice in the college gymnasium, where there is a dummy horse. As they progress, the players are given army horses and meet on the college field. Trained horses cannot be obtained, but some good material is being developed from the large number of horses owned by the military department.

LARGEST ELECTRIC SIGN IN WORLD

LONDON, Oct. 28. (United Press.)—Operation of what is believed to be the largest electrical sign in existence has just commenced here. The sign, shaped like a star, measuring a quarter of a mile from point to point, serves as a guide for the cross-channel air pilots in landing at night.

The lights are sunk in a groove covered with heavy glass, level with the ground, so that the planes can taxi right across them in landings. The lighting is so arranged that a huge "L" may be displayed to indicate the direction of the wind.

The giant sign is installed at Croydon, the London air station, and landing there will be further facilitated by a searchlight so powerful that it can be seen from a distance of 30 miles, and so penetrating that it can be seen through a heavy cloud bank. Buildings adjacent to the aerodrome will also be outlined in electric lights to avoid collisions in night flying.

The station, as now built and with the minor improvements to be made, is believed to be the best equipped for flying in the world.

FOREIGN MILITARY MEETS IN U. S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(United Press.)—General John J. Pershing, just returned from France, attended today the reception to the Military Board of Allied Supply.

The foreign members of the military board arrived here October 26 on the United States transport Connery. They are: General Charles Jean Marie Payot, quartermaster general of the French army; General A. A. McHardy, of the British army; General Commandatore Hippolito Parelli, of the Italian army; and Colonel Adolphe Cumont, of the Belgian army.

Brigadier-General Charles G. Dawes, United States army, is the American member. The board was first organized to co-ordinate the services of supply and transportation when Marshal Foch took supreme command of the Allied armies in France.

Governor Nathan L. Miller of New York also attended the reception.
