O. A. C. and Calif. Vie For Honors

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28—Cham-
pionship hopes of several football
teams in the Pacific Coast Confer-
ence will depend a great deal upon
tomorrow's games, in which the Uni-
versity of California plays Washing-
ton State College at Portland and
Stanford University meets the Ore-
gon Agriculture College at Stanford.

Tomorrow's contests will be the
first conference games of the year
for Stanford and Washington state.
Last Saturday California defeated the
University and Oregon and the Ag-
gies beat the University of Washing-
ton in the first of the conference
clashes.

row, California will meet, it is be-
lieved, the hardest opposition in the
conference this season. If California
and the Aggies both win, and their
supporters believe they will, they
will remain tied for first place. Some
observers believe these two teams,
which do not meet this year, will re-
main on even terms in the conference
standing throughout the season.

APPLES ARE SHIPPED BY WATER

Large quantities of apples are be-
ing shipped by water this season.
In anticipation of this trade several
large steamships have been equipped
with refrigerator space during the
last year and it is now possible to
make a saving of nearly 25 cents a
box by shipping the apples direct
from the Pacific coast to Europe by
water.

The Oregon Growers Cooperative
association has already sent several
cars of apples by the water route and
more are scheduled to follow. Many
of the large apple shippers of the
northwest are taking advantage of
the lower rates in making foreign
shipments.

The harvest season has been an
ideal one and the packing in the
Willamette and Umpqua valleys is
nearly completed. In many localities
some of the later varieties such as
Yellow Newtown, Ortley and
Baldwin remain to be packed. It is
expected that the work will be fin-
ished by the first of November.
