Farmers to Build Irrigation Glacier

STEVENSVILLE, Mont., Oct. 29.—Ranchers at the mouth of Sweeten Creek near here, are planning to undertake what is declared to be a new experiment in the conservation of water for irrigation purposes.

The ranchers recently formed an organization and laid plans for the building of an immense glacier which they believe will thaw gradually during the hot summer months forming a continuous supply of water for irrigation purposes.

According to E. C. Matthews, secretary of the organization, the plan will be given a thorough test this winter and next summer. A canyon has been selected for the site of the "glacier." Water is to be brought through pipes from a nearby lake and will be sprinkled over the bed of the canyon from high trucks.

It is the belief of the ranchers that the valley will be filled with a huge mass of ice by the time spring and the end of cold weather arrives. It is said that the experiment will not be expensive.

Smut Resisting Wheat Found

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 29.—A real smut resisting wheat, which is expected will save the state of Washington alone more than a million dollars a year, is believed to have been developed at the Washington State College experimental station. It is announced here. On tests covering the last six years, not a sign of smut has been detected on the wheat, it is said.

The wheat is a cross between Turkey Red and Florence, a white Australian wheat of high quality, and is called Smut Proof.

Smut Proof, itself, as a hard red winter wheat with a milling quality said to be equal to if not exceeding Marquis which is among the best now grown. The bushel weight, averaging about 63 pounds, is high, and the yield is said to rank well. Smut Proof averaged 44.7 bushels to the acre during a three year test, which is said to be very nearly equal the average of Hybrid 125, the most popular winter wheat in eastern Washington.

The seed will not be distributed for general use until after tests have been continued for a number of years more with a view to improving the variety. It was said at the experimental station.

Washington state is said to lose over a million dollars a year through smutty wheat. It is the hope of the department to remedy this loss.

Hungry Veteran Falls Exhausted

SALEM, Oct. 29.—Gassed three times while in the Canadian army, Ronald F. Cameron, 53 years old and United States veteran of the world war, on his way to Grants Pass fell exhausted from hunger on the Pacific highway near Hubbard and was picked up by Dr. S. W. Weaver of that city and taken to the doctor's home where he received medical attention and through the instrumentality of the Willamette chapter of the American Red Cross provided funds to continue his way, yesterday.

According to Mrs. Arthur S. Benson, executive secretary of the Willamette chapter, Cameron told Dr. Weaver that he enlisted in the Canadian army in Montreal and was later transferred to a British regiment. He was gassed in 1915, 1916 and 1917 and was later discharged, coming to this country and enlisting with the forces of the United States, receiving an honorable discharge, September 7, 1919.

For some time Cameron has been living in Grants Pass, supporting the wife and two children of his brother who was killed with the Canadian forces overseas, but had been out of employment there and had sought work in Portland. Failing to find anything to do there, after months of searching, he determined to hike back to Grants Pass and was on his way when he fell exhausted from hunger on the highway yesterday.

Dr. and Mrs. Weaver provided the ex-soldier with food and administered medical treatment, also giving him funds for his expenses to Grants Pass at the request of the Red Cross secretary.

Mrs. Arthur Benson is requesting the Red Cross chapter at Grants Pass to investigate Cameron's case and ascertain if compensation can possibly be obtained for him from the government because of his services with our forces.

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Well-Rotted Barnyard Manure, Free From Weeds, is Best.

It Gives Best Results if Applied to Soil Before Plowing in Order That It May Become Thoroughly Incorporated.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Well-rotted barnyard manure which is comparatively free from weeds is the most satisfactory fertilizer for fall-sown alfalfa, according to specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. It should be spread on the land before plowing, in order that it may become thoroughly incorporated with the soil. Good results also follow from heavy applications to the preceding crop.

If the manure is not available, a liberal application of commercial fertilizers rich in phosphoric acid should

be made. The percentage of nitrogen may be low, but some nitrogen should be supplied for the use of the young plants before they become inoculated and are able to secure their supply from the air. On most clay soils heavy applications of potash have not been profitable. A combination which has been commonly recommended is muriate of potash 75 to 100 pounds, acid phosphate 330 to 500 pounds, and nitrate of soda 50 to 75 pounds. The cheapest and most satisfactory method by which the consumer may obtain such combination is to purchase the desired ingredients and mix them himself in their proper proportions.

WHITEWASH RECIPE IS GOOD

One of Cheapest and Most Lasting Wood Coverings is Quite Easy to Manufacture.

Government whitewash is one of the cheapest and most lasting wood coverings and protectors. It is simple to make. Take a half bushel of lime and slack with warm water, keeping it covered. Strain through cheesecloth, and add eight quarts of salt, previously dissolved in warm water. Next stir in three pounds of ground rice, boiled to a thin paste, and stirred in boiling hot. Then add a half pound of plaster of paris, previously dissolved with a pound of glue, over a slow fire. Last, five gallons of hot water. Stir thoroughly and let stand for three days. Apply while hot. An application to fences, trees and unpainted outbuildings will add \$500 to the selling value of a farm, and sell it quicker.

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
