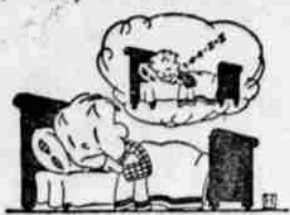


It was time to wake up, all right

Mr. Hawley Sues For Divorce Again

PORTLAND, Nov. 1.—As an echo of the Hawley divorce suit which was fought through the courts in Oregon City in 1920 and carried to the state supreme court last spring without freeing Willard Hawley, son of W. P. Hawley, wealthy paper manufacturer from his matrimonial bonds, suit for divorce has been filed at Hillsboro by Mr. Hawley against Mrs. Marjorie Hawley on the grounds of desertion. The case may be transferred to Multnomah county for trial if Mrs. Hawley objects to facing the proceedings in Washington county, according to announcements of Harrison Allen, attorney for Mrs. Hawley, last night.

Mr. Hawley asked in his complaint that custody of the child be awarded him, or that joint custody be awarded both parents. He likewise petitioned that he be decreed sole owner of all the property now in his name, and that his wife be denied alimony or any interest in it.

Hawley went to Hillsboro late Thursday with his attorney, Harrison Allen, of Portland, to file the papers. The papers were taken out for service on the defendant and were not returned to Hillsboro until late this afternoon.

Mrs. Marjorie Hawley, when interviewed by telephone at her home at Oregon City last night, declared that she and Willard had agreed not to discuss the case. Mr. Hawley referred all questions to Mr. Allen.

According to Mr. Allen, the suit was filed Thursday at Hillsboro charging Mrs. Hawley with desertion. Mr. and Mrs. Hawley have lived apart for the last two years, he said. Mrs. Hawley has not yet been served with a legal notice of the suit and the time of hearing has not been set, Mr. Allen said.

The original suit, which was tried in Oregon City, developed into a sensational case with charges of unfaithfulness against the wife, countered with charges of cruelty against the husband. Mr. Hawley won the decree. Mrs. Hawley appealed from the decree and the decision was reversed by the supreme court.

National Workers Here Thursday

Mrs. Ward Swope of Portland, well known to Oregon W. C. T. U. workers will also be a part of this team, and Rev. C. F. Swander state secretary will be the other. The ladies will entertain their guests at the church with luncheon, and those attending the service will be asked to remain and enjoy the day. Those who cannot come for the entire day, are urged to be there at least part of the day. There will be a stereoscopic lecture at the evening hour.

Famous Song to Be Heard In Opera

"O promise me that some day, you and I
Will take our love together to some sky;
Where we can be alone and faith re-
new,
And find the hollows where those
flowers grow;
Those first sweet violets of early
spring.
Which come in whispers, thrill us
both and sing
Of love unspeakable that is to be
Oh promise me, oh promise me."

This famous old song is known to every one who has ever heard "Robin Hood" sung, but what they do not know is that it had no place in the original score of the opera, but an interpolation, like "The Last Rose of Summer" in "Martha." While Reginald DeKovan wrote the beautiful melody to which it is sung, his collaborator, Harry B. Smith, did not write the lyric.

The words were written a number of years ago by Clement Scott, the famous English critic, and were first read at a luncheon in London when Mrs. Kendall, the great actress took pride in the fact that the author had dedicated the sentimental verses to her, and read them aloud.

Imagine her chagrin when the countess of Warwick, unfolded a paper with the identical verses upon it, which Scott had dedicated to her fair self. Before the luncheon was over, two-thirds of the fair sex present had exhibited similar proofs of chivalric attention.

The song was first interpolated by Jessie Bartlett Davis the original "Alan-a-Dale" of the Bostonians and ever since it has had an honored place in the second act. "Robin Hood" is now being produced on a lavish scale by Ralph Dunbar and "Oh Promise Me" will be heard at the Antlers, Friday, November 4th, when the Dunbar organization sings the DeKovan score.
