Investigate Killing Of Elk Herds

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Nov. 1.—(U. P.)—J. W. Kinney, state supervisor of game and game fish is expected to reach here this week with Federal Game Warden Steele, of Portland, Ore., to look into the circumstances surrounding the slaughter of a considerable number of elk in the Olympic and adjacent forests.

Carcasses of elk have been found at several points on the peninsula. The only portion made use of was the teeth. They had been removed, evidently for ornaments, local wardens declared.

Federal Warden Steele is said to have planned an extensive survey of elk herds on the peninsula, particularly in the Hoh country. It is believed that the wanton slaughter of the protected animals has precipitated an investigation which was scheduled to have awaited the coming of winter.

One Scaffold Only is Needed

SALEM, Nov. 1.—John L. Rathle and Elvie D. Kirby, alias James Owen, will swing to their death on December 2 next from the same scaffold which a year ago November 5, claimed the life of Neil Hart, their companion in the ill-fated jail break of July, 1919, which resulted in the laying of Sheriff T. H. Taylor of Umatilla county, the crime for which the lives of all three men have been declared forfeit, and on one of which he forfeit has been claimed.

Unless present plans are changed, the one scaffold will serve for the two hangings, according to Warden E. E. Compton, who denies that there is any occasion for a second scaffold.

Having exhausted their every legal resource in their fight for life and with Governor Olcott committed to a policy of non-interference in their behalf, the two doomed men have become entirely reconciled to their fate according to officials and guards at the prison.

Rathle and Owen are confined in the same cells in which they have been held ever since their arrival at the penitentiary a year ago. Each man occupies a separate cell, and guard is constantly on duty since the attempt of Abe Evans—also sentenced to hang on December 2—to take his own life two weeks ago. These cells are in one of the main wings of the building and are in no sense isolated except that they are located at the end of the wing which is naturally less frequented than the front of the wing.

Neither Rathle or Owen are or ever have been in solitary confinement in the term in which "solitary" is used in prison parlance. They spend the day in reading and smoking and in conversation back and forth between the cells, four of which hold men sentenced to die—the other two being George Howard from Malheur county and Abe Evans from Wasco county. Every day for 30 minutes they are released from the confinement of the cell and permitted to stretch their limbs in a walk up and down the corridor under close guard while their cells are cleaned out. This is their only exercise.

Being reconciled to their fate they do not discuss it but appear to be content to let the future take care of itself.

Movie Closeups

There is a world of humor in "His Pajama Girl," starring Billie Rhodes, which is showing at the Liberty theatre. This picture in its opening scenes looks as though a dark and evil plot is being hatched. And as it speedsly unwinds itself it develops several merry chuckles until its final stages produce a riot of laughter.

A strong cast has been supplied in support of Miss Rhodes. It includes Harry Rattenberg, Harry Edwards, and George French, Eddie Barry, a number of Pajama Girls, and others.

In its early stages the story has to do with a couple of plotters who are endeavoring to overthrow a certain Latin republic. They are being financially aided by Dolly Dodd's dad. When the secret service operative appears on the job he is busily occupied in trailing the thieves and cultivating the acquaintance of Dolly.

This double task is made still more difficult upon one of the plotters for his daughter's hand.

However, things are almost nicely arranged when Dolly disappears clad merely in her pajamas. The search and complication that ensue give the picture an unusual turn.

As fine a blending of pathos and comedy as has marked any screen play appearing in many months is to be seen in "Bunty Pulls the Strings," a Reginald Barker production, released by Goldwyn, which is showing at the Antlers theatre tonight.

Based on an excellent plot the story that is told "catches on" at the very beginning, and holds one's attention without a break to the end. It tells of a Scotch girl and her love affair with "Weelum," which she was ready to sacrifice for the sake of her stern old father, and her erring brothers, but which "turn out all right in the end," because—but to tell the story would spoil the picture or those who have the pleasure of seeing it still before them.

The character drawing in "Bunty Pulls the Strings" is wonderfully done. The photography and setting of the play also make a deep impression. The Goldwyn firm erected a Scotch village in California especially for the taking of the picture.

No one player is starred in the picture, but all of those who take part have established enviable records, and are well known. Leatrice Joy, one of the most attractive girls in pictures, plays "Bunty," and Russell Simpson, who made such a hit in "Godless Men," plays "Tam," the father.

"One Wild Week," in which Belle Daniels will be seen at the Majestic theatre tonight, is the story of an orphaned heiress who has lived a cheerless life with an overbearing aunt until her eighteenth birthday, when she makes a break and goes to the city to visit an old friend of her dead mother. At least she starts for the city home of Mrs. Brewster, but through a plausible combination of circumstances, she really arrives at quite another place.

There is a likeable young man played by Frank Kingsley. He meets the girl early in the story and becomes her champion from that moment. It is typical, however, that when he goes to the reformatory—yes, that's where she landed—to assure her that he will get her released, she borrows his car and, with three other girls makes her own escape right then. She has more adventures, however, before she finally disposes of Aunt Emma's claim to her fortune, and secures it to herself—and her prospective husband.

NATIONAL FARM LOANS EXPLAINED

Secretary of Local Organization Tells of Plan Upon Which Money is Loaned.

SECURITY IS DEMANDED

Government Is Now Receiving Great Number of Requests for Loans While Funds Are Limited—Best Security Taken.

"As long as there are people there will be indebtedness, and while this indebtedness is of every description the one that appears to be the most vital at this time is in the form of a financial indebtedness, rather than a social one. Many people are seeking to gather all their small obligations under one head and in that way confine their efforts in one aim and thus eventually clear up their debts as far as money matters are concerned. To do this they realize that they must be able to give satisfactory security for the money which they owe, and in the majority of cases, especially among the farming population, this security must consist entirely of real estate," says Miss Sylvia Brown, Secretary of the Roseburg National Farm Loan association.

"The Federal Farm Loan system was created for the special purpose of assisting the farmers of the United States to more conveniently carry their indebtedness and at the same time give them an opportunity to improve their farms more rapidly. Loans of this class are made only to farmers who reside upon and cultivate their own land either personally or through hired help, thus giving the actual producer the advantage over the land holder who rents out his property to tenants.

"Federal farm loans are based on fifty percent of the actual valuation of the land and twenty percent of the valuation of the permanent improvements, and are made for the purpose of purchasing land, paying off indebtedness existing on and or improvements, purchasing stock or implements to thus build up the earning power of the land, and for the purpose of adding buildings and other permanent improvements to the property.

"Loans of this class now run for a period of thirty-three years and draw interest at the rate of 6 percent per annum, payable semi-annually. These loans, however, can be paid off at the end of the fifth year or at any interest paying date thereafter if the borrower so desires, or small payments may be made, on any interest paying date, over and above the regular payment of principle and interest then due.

"In speaking of the class of land upon which loans can be made the Roseburg National Farm Loan association recently received a letter from the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, which reads in part as follows: 'We are expected to loan only upon complete farm units, and a farm unit, under our meaning of the term, is a tract of land with suitable buildings thereon, of an acreage sufficient, when put to the uses to which it is best adapted and under the care of an ordinarily intelligent farmer, to produce a revenue sufficient to maintain the borrower and his family and in addition to meet the amortization installments upon the loan sought as they mature.'

"Many people seem to have gained the impression that there is no expense attached to the securing of loans of this class and are greatly disappointed when they learn that there are small fees in connection therewith. There is, however, a certain amount of labor necessary to

carry on any work of this nature and all those who wish to enjoy the advantage of a reasonable loan are also expected to pay their portion of the maintenance fees. The fees in connection with these loans consist of an evidence of good faith fee, amounting to \$5 for all sums up to \$5000, and \$10 for \$5000 and all sums over that amount, and also a small fee for the examination of title. These two fees are payable to the Federal Land Bank through which the loan is obtained. The fees of the local association, which is known as the Roseburg National Farm Loan Association, amount to one percent of the amount applied for; this fee must cover all local expense in connection therewith and the association has no authority to collect anything, in excess thereof. In no case, however, can any local loan association guarantee that the amount of money applied for will be forthcoming. The applicant is supposed to bear in mind the actual valuation of the property upon which he desires a loan and not seek to obtain an exorbitant amount in accordance with the security he has to offer.

"There are about seventy local associations doing business in the state of Oregon, those in Douglas county, outside of Roseburg being located at Myrtle Creek, Oakland and Drain, and specific information concerning any particular loan can be obtained by calling on the secretary-treasurer of any of these associations.

"The same precaution is necessary in making application for a loan of this class as for any other loan, viz: apply for the least amount possible to cover immediate needs. Since the Federal Land Banks opened for business on January 1st, 1921, the amount of money available for loans has been limited and thousands are making application for the small amount they have on hand. It is therefore necessary that they take only the most safe and sound risks which are presented to them and weed out those where an exorbitant amount is asked in accordance with the security offered. The solution of this problem would be, seek only to borrow that which is actually needed."
