PUBLICITY FOR HOME CAUSES.

The basic essential in promoting civic advance is publicity. This is the great communicator of enthusiasm. People are not much interested to take hold and work in public causes except as they feel themselves part of some general movement. They are like soldiers in an army. The individual soldier left to himself loses the enthusiasm that comes with a mass of people doing the same thing. He needs to feel himself a part of an organized and achieving body, in order to attain a high morale.

Publicity is the means by which individual citizens are inspired to ally themselves with public movements and give time and effort to improving projects. Being informed what other people are doing, they feel a desire to do their own share, and to help their community make gains in business and public advantages.

The principal factor in providing the publicity needed to energize community movements is the home town newspaper. From such journals you learn the work being accomplished in your home town, the projects held in view, what each must do to perform his share. The individual is thus inspired to take hold and co-operate.

November 7 to 12 has been named by the newspapers as "Home Town Paper Week," and it is an occasion for asking people to bring in or renew their subscriptions for another year. This is not asked as a personal favor. It is requested so that the newspapers can continue and enlarge the work they are all the time doing to promote community causes and civic and business progress.

The News-Review joins in this movement, and solicits the subscriptions of its townspeople, promising that in return for the same it will give the most generous and untiring support possible to all local causes and devote itself as always to the advancement of every project for the betterment of Roseburg and the county at large.

CO-OPERATING WITH THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Money for public schools comes hard in many places. Sometimes it would be easier if it didn't come so hard, to state a paradox. There were towns that refused to build needed school houses during the period before the war, that now have put them up at two or three times the cost that would have been adequate in 1910. Mighty little economy there.

The school appropriation is commonly the largest single form of municipal expenditure. But as the future of the community depends on its schools more than on any other one thing, this is only natural and it should be so.

Many economists oppose making a reasonable appropriation for schools, on the ground that the sum spent is already large. But they fail to ask whether it is as much as other progressive communities of the same size or wealth are expending. A town must have schools comparing favorably with its competitors, if it is to continue to grow and flourish.

A city that has a reputation for good schools will draw newcomers much faster than one that has not this distinction. Good schools pay for themselves, by turning out a superior class of young people who are able to do better work for the advancement of business and civic progress. Also they pay for themselves by attracting residents who desire the best facilities for their young folks.

Attorney General
Asked For Opinion

The question of whether or not the county is required to turn over to the city, money paid into the county road fund by the taxpayers of the road district composed of the municipality, has been submitted to the Attorney General for an opinion. The city today presented its claim for \$7500 claimed to be due from the county. It being proposed by the city to use this money in paving South Stephens street. The county court claims that this money which was collected before the new law became effective cannot be procured by the city unless the county desires to turn it over. The Attorney General will be asked to decide the point at issue. In the meantime it is very doubtful if anything is done in the way of improving the South Stephens street entrance as the contract stands ready to be signed but the Mayor has no power to sign the contract until the county agrees to turn over the money demanded by the city.

Hancock Mountain
Contract is Let

The contract for the improvement of Hancock Mountain was let by the county court yesterday to Joeklyn and Eldon, the contract being in the sum of approximately \$39,000. This is one of the biggest jobs ever undertaken by a county. A new road is being built through almost solid rock and is being put on a substantial and permanent grade. One half of the project has already been done by the county under force account but as the bid was satisfactory on the remaining half it was decided to put it out to contract. When finished the improvement will become a part of the Drain-Redsport highway and will eliminate a dangerous road as well as many bad grades and turns.

League Director
Meets With Court

S. D. Evans, representing the directors of the Taxpayers league was present this morning at the opening of the county court sessions to take up with the court a number of matters considered by the league directors. Owing to the interlocking of the duties of the County Roadmaster and Surveyor, there has been considerable discussion regarding the fees and salary of this office. The directors of the league desire that the office be placed on a flat salary but a number of conflicts present themselves when this move is considered. Mr. Evans also discussed matters relative to the printing of county court proceedings and notices and the district attorney was requested to give an opinion on certain features of this question. The responsibility of the county court in mistakes in payment was also discussed and a protest made regarding the payment of travelling expenses to the county school superintendent on unimproved matters.
