Grangers Will Have Big Meeting

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—The 55th annual convention of the National Grange will be held at Portland, Nov. 16 to 25, with delegates from 33 states in attendance. Problems of farm production and distribution, including latest phases in the development of co-operative marketing, will be discussed.

Special trains bringing delegates from the east are to arrive the afternoon of Nov. 15, and that evening the visitors will be entertained at a banquet tendered by the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Sherman J. Lowell, of Fredonia, N. Y., national master of the grange, will deliver his annual report at the opening session, and the convention will then proceed to discussion of problems of the farmer.

There will be sessions Nov. 16, 17 and 18, and on the 19th the delegates will be taken on a trip in inspection of the river and harbor, proceeding later in the day to Vancouver, Wash.

Sunday, Nov. 20, will be spent in religious and memorial services at Portland, and Monday the visitors will be taken over the Columbia river highway. Tuesday they will visit Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis, and on Wednesday, Nov. 23, they will be guests of Beaverton Grange at Beaverton, Ore.

Gold Holdings Rise to New Record

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Gold holdings of the United States, the world's sole creditor nation, mounted to a new high record last month, approximating the stupendous sum of \$3,500,000,000. Statisticians estimate this to be 35 to 40 per cent of the world's visible supply.

Of this amount the twelve federal reserve banks hold a total of about \$930,000,000, the bulk of which resides in the vaults of the local institutions.

Metal which has been pouring into this country ever since the close of the war has averaged \$75,000,000 monthly this year.

Some of the gold bears the stamp of nations born after the European cataclysm and some of the minted metal is almost as rare and strange to the average observer as an old time Spanish doubloon.

Part of the gold sent here by Germany to meet reparations payments to the allies was said to be French coin (Louis D'or) extracted by Germany from France as indemnity after the Franco-Prussian war in 1870.

The amount of gold bars now held by the local assay office is not disclosed, but the machinery of that institution has been taxed to capacity recently reducing foreign bullion to requisite fineness for the domestic market. Bars valued at many millions of dollars have been shipped from this city to the Philadelphia mint in the last few months to be made into coin.

The many national and state banks of this city, together with affiliated trust companies, the New York Clearing House and almost countless private money changers and dealers in coin and bullion probably hold at this time a total of between \$1,000,000,000 and \$1,250,000,000.

FARM POINTERS

(O. A. C. Experiment Station.)

Bordeaux Hits Lichens.

Moss and lichens are beginning to flourish on fruit trees and roofs since the advent of wet weather. Experiment station tests show that Bordeaux is the most effective and permanent protection against these plant forms. Directions for making Bordeaux may be had free by writing to the college.

Federation Wheat Best.

Several lots of federation and hard federation wheat were grown this year, and some of the seed is still in the hands of the farmers. These varieties have been tested out thoroughly and found best for either irrigated or dry-farm conditions. As only limited quantities of seed are available, spring supplies should be obtained before this wheat is sent to the mills. Lists of growers having this wheat may be had from the department of farm crops.

Strawberries Need Rotation.

The strawberry crown borer, an elongate, whitish worm that tunnels in the taproot and crown of the strawberry plant, can best be controlled by rotation. No sprays or soil treatment are effective against this pest which is a harder plantings most serious. Grow strawberries on the land two full crop years, then plow the fields in the fall. Individual plants affected in younger plantings should be dug up and burned.

Grass Seeds Tested Free.

A sample of commercial Kentucky bluegrass seed received by the farm crops department to be tested for purity shows less than 17 per cent pure seed and more than 82 per cent chaff. Such seed is not only expensive at any price, but if sown at the usual rate would be wasted. Seed samples sent in are tested for purity free of charge in the college laboratories.

Help in Building Greenhouse.

From four quarters of the state there has come to the department of vegetable gardening requests for information as to how best to proceed with the erection of a small green-

house for use in propagating young vegetable plants. This is a suitable time to be considering the matter so as to have the house in readiness for the spring work. Plans and suggestions for a small greenhouse have been sent to those requesting the information and will be given free to any others desiring them.

Soil Samples Examined.

Soil samples sent in to the O. A. C. Experiment station should always be accompanied by certain information relative thereto. Circulars telling what data are necessary may be had free by writing to the soils department. While a complete chemical analysis cannot be made of every sample, acid and alkali tests are made in each instance and much valuable information and advice can be given when the proper data are at hand.

Onions Worth Care.

The present price of onions make it well worth while for the growers to care properly for their stored supplies. Oregon onions should keep well this winter as they went into storage in excellent condition due to the dry weather the latter part of September. The matter of proper ventilation should not be neglected, however.
