RED CROSS SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 13.

The following statement by President Harding, urging universal support of the Annual Roll Call of the American Red Cross which began generally throughout the country November 11, continuing through Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 24, has been issued from the White House:

As president of the United States of America and as president of the American Red Cross, I announce that the Red Cross Annual Roll Call started on Armistice Day, Nov. 11, and will continue through Thanksgiving Day, November 24, and I designate November 13 as Red Cross Sunday.

I recommend ministers and priests of all congregations to stress the gospel of service on November 13, and I invite and urge my fellow citizens to accept the entire period of the Roll Call as an occasion for re-dedication of themselves to the principles and practices of service. The American Red Cross is both the volunteer and semi-official medium through which our people may appropriately express their patriotic and humane desires to render practical assistance to their soldiers and sailors, to their fellow citizens in civilian life, and to those people of other lands who have a human claim on the sympathetic concern of our own people.

The American Red Cross has kept faith with the principles which gave it birth and with the obligations laid upon it by congressional charter—"to act in matters of voluntary relief and in accord with the military and naval authorities as a medium of communication between the people of the United States and their army and navy;" after a notable war service, it, in conjunction with the Veterans' Bureau and other activities, stands by our veterans and their families in a period of painful reconstruction, in which, as too many of us have been prone to forget, thousands are in pressing need, not only of governmental attention and assistance, but also of those supplementary acts of human kindness which only volunteer mercy can supply.

It is a fundamental principle of the Red Cross not to duplicate but to supplement the efforts of governmental and other agencies in the mitigation and alleviation of human suffering, and to supply the means thereto where other agencies do not exist. The call of the American Red Cross is the call of country and humanity, and I earnestly urge my fellow citizens to make that response which satisfies the promptings of a generous people.

One of the reasons why manufacturing costs are high on many goods, is that they are produced under costly conditions in large cities. Many manufacturers claim they are almost forced to do business in these great centers of population, because it is easier to get help there. Yet they have to pay high wages because it costs more to live in big cities. Many manufacturers have tried moving out into the smaller cities and into the country. It has happened in many cases that their help would not follow them and they could not always secure it where they went. The nation looks with pride at its vast and rich cities, with their tremendous populations, and thinks that these great centers are a sign of national prosperity. They indicate rather an abnormal desire to huddle together that makes living and production more expensive. Better conditions for factory production are found in a community where the workers can live close to their homes and obtain rents at prices below what would be paid in large cities. The cost of merchandise at the stores and of produce brought in from the country, should be below the figures paid in large cities. The ideal situation for locating a new business is in the outskirts of a community where a considerable amount of inexpensive land can be used for developing homes for the workers. Where dwellings are provided in such a neighborhood, the rents can be made lower than in a congested population, and garden space and air and sunshine can be had without much cost. It becomes possible under such conditions to build up permanent and efficient bodies of workers who can save money on pay that would never give comfort in a large city.

Armistice Day, as a national holiday, bids fair to be the most popular of all holidays. America is not prone to forget the service rendered by her patriotic sons on the battlefield, as well as the boys in other various pursuits who enlisted in behalf of their country. Yesterday's demonstrations throughout the United States is evidence that American patriotism is blended into the hearts of our millions of people with a fervor that strengthens each succeeding year.

It's mighty hard to get down to business after a holiday. And it takes some effort to wake up business following a day of celebration.

Interest Shown In Health Work

Miss Carolyn Wallace says "Health means not only freedom from illness but a reserve force of energy and strength." Much interest is being shown throughout the county in the public health work, and the local county health nurse is doing some very fine work.

In one of the schools visited by Miss Wallace, the directors have shown their interest by taking up a collection at a motion picture entertainment given in the school house, the funds to be used in buying tooth brushes for the school children to start a "Good Teeth" campaign.

These same directors have made plans to bring all children in their district, needing dental care, to town. A great many Douglas county teachers are teaching good health habits, through Modern Health Crusade methods thereby raising the health standard of the county.

Miss Wallace will be glad to discuss with the parents any matter, and advise them as far as possible in matters pertaining to their children's health. Her office at present is with Mr. O. C. Brown, county superintendent of schools. She has visited a good number of schools since her arrival in September, including Drain, Yoncalla, Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Tillamook, Days Creek, Drew, Edenhower and W. Bar.

The association hopes to have good scales with which to weigh and measure the children, placed in every school as soon as possible. The following report for the month of October shows what Miss Wallace has been accomplishing:

Bad Auto Wreck Near Sutherlin

A twelve-cylinder McFarland touring car dashed off the paved stretch of the Pacific highway two miles south of Sutherlin last night at about 7 o'clock, turned several somersaults and plumed the four occupants, all men, beneath it, injuring three of them badly.

Louis Minkers, of San Francisco, suffered a crushed chest and several broken ribs.

W. Bernstein, 722 Everett street, Portland, also had his chest crushed and several ribs broken.

C. H. Shipeno, 46, North Sixth street, Portland, escaped uninjured.

A. Miskund, Salt Lake City, suffered a broken leg.

The wreck victims were removed soon after the accident to the Sutherlin Sanitarium, where they were given treatment.

The driver of the car declared that they were proceeding along the highway at a normal rate of speed and in attempting to pass another car he lost control of the machine and drove into a ditch. The car on its first turn threw the occupants clear, but it followed them and crushed them beneath it.

The injuries are not serious but will necessitate the men remaining in bed for some time. The wrecked car is of a late type and beautifully upholstered in the finest of leather. Two wheels were smashed, the windshield and top broken to bits, and the tonneau dented in several places.
