

Red Cross Canvass Is Successful

Reports being received at headquarters from the corps of volunteer workers indicates that a most systematic canvass is going to be made in the territory assigned them. Those who have been approached to renew their membership have given their dollar cheerfully and without protest, and seem proud to be the possessor of a button signifying a year's membership in this big-brother movement.

Members of the Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion are behind this movement, for they realize and fully understand the Red Cross has and always will render first service to the ex-soldier and his family. At the last annual convention of the Legion held in Kansas City, the following resolution was adopted, showing that the American Legion stands back of the Red Cross in its campaign:

"WHEREAS the American Red Cross rendered valiant and unflinching service to the service men of America during the war; and

"WHEREAS the American Red Cross is now cooperating to the fullest extent with the American Legion

in its efforts to obtain immediate and adequate relief for disabled service men; and

"WHEREAS the American Red Cross is now appealing to the American public for support necessary to carry out its splendid work, therefore be it

"RESOLVED that the American Legion in convention assembled, endorse the Roll Call of the American Red Cross and call upon the service men of America to lend their influence and best efforts to the Roll Call in recognition of service that has been and is still being rendered."

It is going to be necessary for those canvassing the city to return to some homes as the occupants were not in when they first called. If you have not been personally solicited, we urge that you call at the Red Cross headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce rooms and get a receipt and a Red Cross honor button for your year's membership. A large number called yesterday, and this volunteer effort on your part is going to greatly facilitate in making a canvass of the city and allow us to reach the quota which we have accepted.

There are numerous calls by local men and women who are asking for some kind of employment, and these people are going to need clothing and groceries this winter to tide them over for a short time until they can again find regular employment. What is to become of these people in our midst if you do not join the Red Cross and place your money in a fund to be used for these purposes?

When the campaign is completed and the funds are approximately an enlarged advisory committee will be formed and in this way it is hoped to eliminate duplication of efforts and expenditures of funds, but to more wisely assist the needy cases by finding them employment, or giving them the articles that are most needed to weather the temporary disaster that has befallen that family or individual.

Surely those of us who have a good home, warm fires, and enjoy three meals a day can give a dollar to assist our less fortunate brother who through adverse circumstances he they what they may, has fallen in his honest efforts to provide a livelihood for his family.
