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Council Holds
Short Meeting

A very brief meeting of the city council was held last night. Practically all of the city business was disposed of at the previous meeting and only a few routine matters were up for consideration. The final estimates were read on the Laurelwood sewer and the payments approved and allowed, the recorder being instructed to draw warrants in favor of the contractor.

The City Engineer was instructed to see that the cement curbs on Fowler street are smoothed up. When the pavement was laid and the forms removed the curbs were found to be very rough. The contractor has agreed to have these curbs smoothed and the engineer was ordered to see that the work is properly done.

The ordinance adopting the tax levy for city purposes was placed on third reading and passed, while the ordinance calling for the improvement of Rice street was also passed.
