HAS SUNDAY SCHOOL

WALCOTT, Ia., Nov. 25.—(United Press.)—The most completely atheistic community in the United States—not in Greenwich Village nor New England intellectual circles, but in this sturdy German-American hamlet of 769—has been invaded by the Sunday school.

There hasn't been a sermon from a pulpit in twenty-five years. A church started here twenty-six years ago, failed and the building is now used to store farm implements.

Walcott was settled back in 1854 by a group of Holstein men from the German-Danish frontier, who came here to escape religious intolerance.

But women, the wives of agnostics, wanted their children to have the advantages of a Sunday school. The wife of the superintendent of schools, a newcomer, started one with twenty kiddies a month ago. The next Sabbath 55 children attended.

Card games and dances, old-fashioned square dances, are the favorite forms of amusement in Walcott. Sunday is the usual day for dances, and frequently the entertainments last until 2 and 3 o'clock in the morning.

"What harm is there in dancing?" asks the mayor. "People come here from church towns to dance with us on Sunday."

Roseburg Wins From Grants Pass

The Roseburg high school closed its football season yesterday by brilliantly defeating the Grants Pass eleven by a score of 6 to 0, in a muddy but fast game at Grants Pass. The local team showed a marked improvement and at all times was on the offensive.

The game was played in a downpour of rain and the field was muddy and sloppy, slowing up both teams and making passing uncertain. As a result both teams were forced to resort to old style football, and line bucking was the order of the game.

Because of the wet there were many fumbles on both sides causing many thrilling moments.

The Roseburg defense was strong for the first time this year. The heavy Grants Pass backs were unable to get through the Roseburg line which held time after time for downs.

Formerly the Roseburg defense has been very weak, but Coach King has successfully patched up the holes and his defense in yesterday's game was almost perfect.

The game was even throughout, Roseburg's lone touchdown coming as the result of a fluke play, which however, was the result of quick headwork. For the first two quarters the teams saw-sawed back and forth, neither goal being in danger.

Roseburg kept the ball in the Grant Pass territory most of the time and on several occasions threatened the goal but were unable to score.

In the last part of the third quarter, Roseburg punted to the Grants Pass 35 yard line. The Grants Pass player fumbled the ball and it was recovered by Adelbert Abraham.

Roseburg end. Roseburg was held for three downs and on the fourth down Thurston attempted a drop-kick. He fumbled the ball and it rolled for about 10 feet. He quickly recovered the ball and made a long pass to Abraham who was downed on the Grants Pass 10 yard line. Two line plunges carried the ball over. The goal kick failed.

For the first year of football the high school team has set a good record. The boys started out with a very weak team. Under the efficient tutelage of Coach King, however, they have made rapid strides and each game has shown them stronger than before. They have shown themselves to be possessed of a good knowledge of the finer points of the game although they lacked experience and weight. Their performance, during the last two games has shown them to be on a par with some of the best teams of the state and with the experience gained this year, they should chalk up some good victories next season.

Prospects are that most of this year's team will return to school next season while there will be added weight in next year's line and back field to replace those who drop out. Several of the heaviest players this year were forced out of the team because their grades were not up to standard and they have been working hard to get their records in shape for next season.

Safer in Moscow Than U. S. Cities

By EDWIN W. HULLINGER, (United Press Staff Correspondent.) MOSCOW. (By Mail).—Crime in the ordinary sense of burglary, hold-ups and personal assaults, hardly exists now in Moscow.

The streets of Moscow are safer for the pedestrian at midnight or 3 in the morning than in New York, Chicago, or Kansas City. House-breakings are extremely rare.

Active firing squads, specializing on burglars, and thousands of Red soldiers, literally everywhere throughout the city, both day and night, armed with long bayoneted rifles and orders to shoot pillagers on sight, did the trick. Capital punishment is still the penalty for stealing.

Everybody is afraid to start anything in Moscow.

What may or may not have been its past, the Red garrison of Moscow—200,000 strong—is today a powerful force for the preservation of law and order. The government is employing it largely in police duty throughout the city.

Red soldiers patrol the streets more closely than any police in the United States. Some idea of the situation can be obtained by imagining a garrison of a million soldiers patrolling New York City. The proportion is one soldier to every seven inhabitants.

Under these circumstances neither lawbreakers nor counter-revolutionists have much chance to start anything and get away with it. Of course, a large number of burglars and others were shot before this calm was obtained.

Residents' accounts agree pretty generally that the present state of affairs has prevailed for two or three years. During the early stages of the revolution, it is true, they say, that human life was not safe in the streets after nightfall. Pillaging and assaults were common. Shots were common sounds at all hours of the night. People were afraid to show themselves outside after dark.

The extent to which the Red guards participated in the pillaging is vigorously disputed by Bolshevik officials. Reports are, however, that there was a certain amount of this before the present rigid discipline had been perfected.

Leaving out all discussion of the past, it may be said that today the Red garrison of Moscow is one of the best disciplined and obedient bodies of men imaginable. They go about their work quietly and with no show of arrogance.

U. S. Explorer Brings New Fruits

By L. S. HAAS (United Press Staff Correspondent.) SANTIAGO, Chile. (By Mail).—Penetrating the hinterlands of Central and Western South America in a search for varieties of fruits, vegetables and fodder plants hitherto unknown in the United States is a quest as scientific and fascinating as the exploration of uncharted seas, according to Wilson Popenoe, of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Popenoe, who is the discoverer of "Rubus Macrocarpus," the giant blackberry of Colombia, said to be the largest edible berry discovered, has just completed a trip of two years in Central and South American countries. He will leave soon for the United States with scores of samples of plants which he believes may be grown in various parts of the United States. Popenoe has pursued his search in Guatemala, Ecuador, Peru, Colombia and Chile.

"The purpose of my trip," he told the United Press, "was not to find vegetation of an absolutely unknown sort but to collect unknown varieties of plants already cultured in the United States with a view of improving and enlarging our own variety. In this, I have been at least moderately successful. My principal object was to obtain better varieties of the 'papa,' or alligator pear, than we are growing, and in Ecuador I encountered alligator pears that are harder and richer in food value than any I have ever seen."

"I am also returning to Washington with samples of the 'Washato' cherry, of Ecuador, named for the town in which it is grown. This

fruit is raised in a climate similar to that of the Gulf and Southwestern states, where, so far, it has been impossible to grow cherries of the North American variety. It is a sweet fruit, deep red in color, and about three-quarters of an inch in diameter. The tree crop is very heavy.

"I am also confident of obtaining in Valparaiso a sample of a fodder-plant, of which I have heard. It is said to be rich in sugar, and of high value as a fattener. Full grown it is about two feet high."

Popenoe is enthusiastic over the future of Chile as a fruit-growing country. He believes that not only can Chilean fruit growers find a ready, profitable market in the United States for the sale of moderate-zone fresh fruits in winter, but that they can be marketed in New York during the winter months at reasonable prices to the consumer and at the same time render a fair profit to the producer.
