Germans Ahead In Race For Trade

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—German industry, reaching out into every corner of the earth for trade, is making big inroads in China.

Chinese representatives here said today that the way things are now heading Germany will outrace England and America unless the latter nations watch out. In some districts where, for instance, big American interests, including Standard Oil, have been the pioneers, Germany is now passing the American trade records as well as the English.

German accommodation to the economic methods and customs of the country with whom it deals is credited by the Chinese as the reason for Germany's fast-growing trade there. China has never cherished very violent feelings about Germany, though she sided with the Allies in the world war. Hence, Germany is not doing it particularly difficult to re-establish herself since conclusion of the Chinese-German trade treaty last summer.

The Germans are putting money into Chinese companies, readily accepting that the Chinese can have the majority holdings—and, in some cases, even advancing money to Chinese interests so the latter can finance their 51 per cent of a concern.

Then again, the Germans have secured the right of "extra territoriality." That means that a German stands on the same basis as a Chinese. Under extra territoriality, an American, for instance, could not be treated by Chinese authorities, but

Instead only by American authorities on Chinese complaint. Again, an American could only trade in the so-called "treaty ports" whereas the Germans have waived the extra territorial right and can go ahead and trade where he chooses.

These instances, above cited, are a part of the German system of adapting their methods to the foreign methods. And the result is that Germany is fast getting a hold in China. Of course, the element of cheap prices, due to the low position of the German mark, has a marked bearing on the problem.

Story of King Revived by Press

SANTIAGO, Chile, (By Mail).—The story of the dream of a kingdom in South America, that was blasted when the Chilean sense of humor stopped short of its realization, is being revived by the Santiago press. It was brought to mind by a cartoon appearing in the "Diario Ilustrado," depicting Herbert Gibbs, president of the British "nitrate pool," flourishing a blade, labelled, "The Sword of Orille."

"Orille, Antoine I," was the title adopted by the self-appointed "King of Araucania and Patagonia," who donned the ermine and served notification on the Chilean Republican government that Chile had a monarch for a neighbor. At the same time Chile was given to understand that the vast territory to the south, no longer remained under the sovereignty of the republic, but was going ahead as a full-fledged kingdom.

The "king" was Antoine Tounens, a lawyer of Perigord, France, who landed in the port of Coquimbo, Northern Chile, in 1858. It appears from the records that exist here, that he migrated for the express purpose of becoming the ruler of the Araucanian Indians—the hardest South American tribe, which was never subjugated by the Spanish conquistadores. "He arrived at Coquimbo on August 22 (1858) where he commenced to learn Spanish and collect data concerning the country (Araucania) that he later visited," the record reads.

In 1860 Tounens made certain propositions to the principal and lesser chiefs of the Araucanians, and on November 17 of that year proclaimed the foundation of the "constitutional and hereditary monarchy" of Araucania, with "Prince Orille-Antoine de Tounens" as king. The proclamation outlined the form of government, providing for a cabinet, a crown council, a council of state and a legislature.

Chile smiled at the venture, and refused to take it seriously until the following, when the "king" evoked electoral assemblies in four southern Chilean cities. That was too much of a joke, and Tounens was arrested. He languished in a prison at Los Angeles, Chile, until 1863, when "fearing that he was going to be shot," he "abdicated" in favor of his father, and was permitted to return to France.

Tounens was philosophical. Upon his return to the land of his birth he settled down to the pastime of most ex-monarchs, and wrote his memoirs.

Italy Finds Way Out of Peril

ROME, Nov. 29.—The Italian workman has at last found himself.

From the radical red of 1918, who started in to occupy by force the Italian industries and sovietize them, he has become in two short years a conservative workman.

During the past few months the attitude of the Italian workmen towards government and capital has undergone a marked change. In a few more months Italy will have solved her post-war economic basis and will start in on a period of productivity that will astonish the world.

Italy's future economic basis may be summoned up in half a dozen words:

CLOSEST CO-OPERATION OF GOVERNMENT, CAPITAL AND LABOR.

Realization of the Italian workman that Italy and possibly Europe as a whole can only be pulled out of the postwar puddle by this new basis of governmental capitalistic and workman's co-operation has been followed by a quick adaptation of the Italian workman to the new basis.

Immediately following the war, the Italian syndicated workman won from the Italian industrial class some most substantial victories in the matter of wages, working hours and working conditions generally. Long time agreements were drawn up between the industrialists and the workmen which granted to the latter what a few years before were undreamed of concessions.

With the cutting off of war production and the necessity of transforming new and gigantic enterprises to a peace time basis, both sides discovered themselves hopelessly in beyond their necks. The industrial crisis in Italy was the same as in other countries.

A basis of collaboration between government and industry was quickly established that saved one-half of the situation, but which was at once jeopardized by the inability to secure similar collaboration with the workmen. The latter stuck for the fulfillment of the advantageous agreements they had imposed after the war. The fight lasted for months, but at last the Italian workman found himself and the readjustment that is now taking place.

Various industries are negotiating directly with their own employees for the necessary readjustment; various national union organizations are similarly treating the questions for their organizations en masse and, finally, the government is similarly intervening for the necessary readjustment.

The most typical example of this was the recent readjustment of the Fiat company. Their workmen after direct discussion with their employers submitted the latter's best offer to referendum. It provided for a ten per cent reduction in salaries and a return to the eight-hour instead of the seven-hour day. It was approved and the employees returned to work the next day. The same spirit has characterized almost every effort at readjustment where the negotiations have been direct between Italian industrialists and their workmen.

Finally the government itself is playing its part—but also on the basis of the new three party combination. At the request of the General Confederation of Labor, it has just appointed a commission of eight industrialists, eight workmen and eight government representatives who will investigate the entire crisis of Italian industries and endeavor to find a satisfactory basis of collaboration for all parties concerned.

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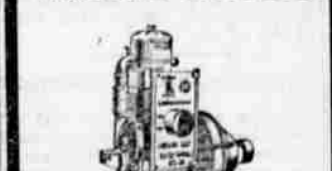
