Treason Charged To French Officer

PARIS, Dec. 1.—Charged with selling the general mobilization plans of the French armies to German spies before the war, Captain Leon Proust of the French army of the Near-East, has just been arrested under extraordinary circumstances more than seven years after the alleged treason. He is held in solitary confinement in the citadel of the fortress of Besancon.

The arrest caused a sensation throughout France. The war department is maintaining silence regarding the details of the charge. Proust was arrested while at home on leave from Syria. Throughout the war Proust served with his regiment and since has been on duty in Morocco in the Near-East.

The unprecedented act of treason is reported to have been first uncovered immediately after the armistice. Among the papers found in a Belgian town after the Germans' hasty evacuation, were documents belonging to a high intelligence officer of the German army. They related to the ramifications of the German spy system before the war. The documents implicated Proust, it is said, in the sale of the mobilization plans. Thru their purchase the Germans were aware of the complete details of France's mobilization plans two months before the outbreak of the war.

Throughout the three years since the armistice, the French secret service has been carefully investigating and at last pounced upon Proust. It is reported that Proust claims that he was employed in counter-espionage before the war and may use the defense that he sold the Germans false information to confuse them.

However, the ministry of war announced that they have sufficient evidence to justify the arrest.

other cities of Brazil to return various visits by Brazilian officials. Ex-Minister Andrea Torre of Italy, is in Sao Paulo dealing with wealthy industrialists there in an effort to get financial backing for the new Rome daily "Il Mondo," which Italians assert will be the great world newspaper of their people.

Eight governments of South and Central America have official French military missions teaching them the art of war. These governments are Guatemala, instructors in the national military academy and one aviation officer; Venezuela, naval and military missions for general reorganization of these services and a special mission to organize an air service; Colombia and Ecuador, aviation missions; Peru, military mission for reorganization of the army and special mission to organize an air service; Uruguay, military mission to reorganize the army; Brazil, military mission to reorganize the army, naval mission and special mission to reorganize the forces of the State of Sao Paulo.

In addition to all this there is a steady stream of French and Italian artists, musicians, poets, medical professors, opera companies, dramatic companies, sculptors and religious emissaries.

Paul Fort, the "prince" of French poets, has just finished a series of lectures in Brazil, Uruguay and Argentina.

The German propaganda is much less apparent, being limited to an occasional opera troupe or scientist. However, the Germans are always well received. There is a strong belief that the German commercial penetration is being carried out much more effectively than surface appearances indicate.

Great Britain and the United States, easily the two leading nations in South American commerce, indulge in almost no propaganda in these countries. Washington has sent only one mission in a year—the Colby party. Great Britain has sent none.
