Thousands of Vets In Need of Care

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—The suicide of Col. Charles W. Whittlesey, leader of the famous "lost battalion," should serve as a "shocking reminder of how the poison of war leaves its trace in men's souls long after the fighting is over," according to John Thomas Taylor, chairman of the legislative committee of the American Legion here.

Taylor, who has been in close touch with the situation surrounding sick and wounded service men since the armistice, declares that thousands of men are in the same mental condition as was Col. Whittlesey, a condition credited with having caused his suicide. The gallant leader's untimely end, Mr. Taylor says, is a summons to the nation "to save its broken defenders before it is too late."

"Nearly 50,000 mildly insane veterans have passed through our hospitals since the armistice," the Legion official declares in a statement. "Despite our efforts, the government has not yet built one good hospital for the care of these men nor established one good rehabilitation center for their cure. If a highly educated, well provided for veteran like Whittlesey surrenders, what may we not fear for the thousands of discouraged, broken-minded and often destitute men kicked around from pillar to post by their government?"

More than one third of the 30,000 disabled veterans now receiving treatment are mentally disabled, according to Mr. Taylor. Of these 10,000, almost 7,500 are scattered through the country in asylums for the criminal and pauper insane.

Western Union Has Xmas Service

The Western Union Telegraph company has solved the Christmas present problem to distant friends and relatives. Reasoning that the most acceptable gift that can be made is money, the company has an arrangement whereby money may be deposited at any of its offices at any time prior to December 25. The money will be forwarded to point of destination and on Christmas morning it will be delivered accompanied by a suitable holiday greeting message giving the name of the sender. The money will be paid in fresh, crisp new bills or by draft, as the sender desires.

In addition to this service it is possible to step into any Western Union office, place an order for the purchase of flowers, candy, cigars, books or similar items. The Western Union will transmit the order together with the money to the point of destination, its representative at that point will make the purchase as specified and arrange for the delivery of it by messenger.

By this arrangement all that is necessary for a resident of Roseburg to do, if he wishes to purchase a present for a friend or relative in Chicago, New Orleans, Los Angeles, or Eugene all that is necessary is to step into the local Western Union office, tell the operator what article he wishes delivered, the time he wants it there and go rejoicing on his way. Or if he wishes money paid as a Christmas gift, deposit the money and on Christmas morning the money will be delivered.

WINTER TREE PLANTING GOOD

Fruit trees may be planted in western Oregon from now on whenever soil and weather conditions permit, say instructors in the O. A. C. Experiment station. Obtain well-matured trees and then prune the roots carefully before setting, to make smooth cuts that will callous over quickly. Watch the roots carefully while pruning and reject trees showing signs of woody aphids, crown gall, or mushroom root rot. Winter setting allows the trees to get well-established for early spring growth and brings the work at a time when labor is abundant.

FALL FRESHENING BEST

Fall freshening cows yield from 10 to 20 percent more milk during the year than those freshening in the spring, and their greatest yield comes at the season when prices are highest, which makes this a profitable dairy practice. Breed cows as far as practicable in December, January, and February for freshening in September, October, and November.

Oregon dairymen and breeders wanting men trained in herdsman-ship are offered a short course in this line at O. A. C. Jan. 3 to June 3, next. Students will spend most of their time at the barn engaged in work with the college herd, under supervision of a specialist. Much actual work with the stock is required because the college proceeds on the plan that no man can become a good herdsman without training and experience. More than 125 head of pure bred dairy cattle, excellent representatives of each breed that made fine records in the show ring last fall, will supply the material for study of management, breeding, milk yield, and pedigree-making. 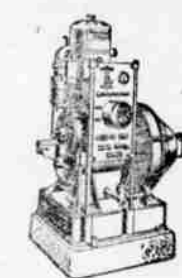
