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MEN GETTING OUT OF SCHOOL WORK.

The men are getting out of the school teaching business. This fact appears in figures just issued by the U. S. bureau of education. While 79 per cent of the college teachers are men, in high schools only 35 per cent are men, and in the lower grade schools only 13 per cent. Every year reduces the number of men in public school teaching and another census will see a still smaller proportion of men in public school work. But is a boy necessarily condemned to an unmanly education if he comes under women instructors? Some parents say yes, without hesitation. Others look around at women teachers of their acquaintance and wonder how any man could communicate any more forceful and virile influence. These teachers have lived lives of true heroism and devotion, they have tackled the burdens of life with energy and determination. They admire and uphold all manly qualities and inspire their boys to live brave and self-sacrificing lives. If our schools could be filled with such teachers, they might not suffer much if the men did go into other callings. But teachers having these gifts are none too common. In the shortage of teachers existing for the past few years, many immature young women have had to be accepted in the schools. Many of these girls have winsome personalities and give promise of mental power. But they have not had much experience in the sufferings and sacrifices of life, hence have not acquired that elevation of spirit that can inspire others toward noble aims. These girl teachers usually marry in a few years, and another inexperienced set take their places. From them the young people may get good book instruction, but they obtain little experience of the world. It is one advantage of the man teacher, that if he likes the calling, he is apt to stay in it permanently. Every year he gains added wisdom and he imparts a sane and well balanced view of life that no immature instructor of either sex can offer.

THE UNKNOWN SOLDIER DEAD.

Public ceremonies usually follow certain stereotyped forms. But the observances in honor of an unknown soldier, which have figured so prominently in Europe since the war, and which have set the key note for Armistice day observances at Arlington cemetery, Washington, suggest a new idea. How has it come about that humanity all through Europe and America is meeting in these solemn conclaves and holding these impressive functions, with the body of some unknown man before them? Probably that unknown was some very humble fellow, who passed obscurely through life. And now he lies in state in some great national burial place. The multitudes venerate him, as they cast the flowers of memory and hope on his exalted grave. Perhaps the reason is that humanity has come as never before to recognize the worth of the individual man. In years past, the kings and the captains summoned the masses of the people to come and go to war for them. What the individual soldier thought made no difference. It was his duty to get out with his gun and fight for his king. He had no possible quarrel with the enemy. But that made no difference. He was simply cannon fodder. Today war is becoming an affair of the peoples. Kings have been put into the discard. Wars will not be fought, unless the people feel called on to fight, which may never occur again on any grand scale. The nations realize that every individual life has its nobility, and they honor every man who goes out to defend his country. He has ceased to be a mere pawn to be moved around by kings, but has become one of the sovereigns of the earth. It is fitting that some representative of him should be laid to rest in national burial places, while the great ones of the earth applaud.

Quarantine on Berry Plants

The strawberry weevil has become so prevalent in the state that it has been found necessary to issue a general quarantine on all plants, according to information received by County Fruit Inspector Armstrong. An order has gone out from the Oregon State Board of Agriculture that any person growing strawberry plants for propagation shall make application in writing to the horticultural commission of the district and that all strawberry fields and their surroundings from which the plants are to be sold, shall be inspected by a duly authorized inspector before the plants are removed.
