Vitamine Is Found In Honey

Eat honey and you eat a vitamine.

Honey is the only commercial sweet that contains vitamins. Fifty thousand dollars worth of vitamins are destroyed annually through European foulbrood in the commercial

manipulation of the state, and no doubt a similar loss comes from lack of training and experience in bee management. All these losses could soon be reduced to a minimum by proper training. Beekeepers will have an opportunity to attend a four-week bee course, January 20 to February 25 at the Oregon Agricultural college, and learn the most up-to-date methods of bee management.

Swarm control is one of the most important factors in the recent development of commercial honey production in Oregon and elsewhere. Many methods are in use but the fundamental principles are the same everywhere and under all circumstances. The practical application of these fundamental principles in swarm control must vary with the circumstances. Probably the greatest single factor in the cause of swarming is a congestion of unemployed bees within the brood-nest or discomfort in this part of the hive from overheating and lack of ventilation. All the factors of swarm control will be taken up in the course.

Disease control and inspection work probably is next in the line of importance in commercial bee work. Loss by disease allowed to go uncontrolled in a single apiary will spread throughout an entire section in a very short time often causing a great loss to the whole community. In addition to swarm control and steady attention will be given to queen rearing, selection and assembling of equipment, spring management, wintering, honey comb and extracted honey production and marketing.

French Courts Cause Comment

VERSAILLES, Nov. 28.—Americans who attended the Landru trial, and there were many, could not refrain from commenting upon the radical difference between the French law of evidence and manner of conducting a trial for murder and

the American courts.

Returning to Paris after a particularly stormy sitting of the court, an American resident of the French capital noticed a stout man alighting at Meudon, in deep conversation with a woman.

"Why, there goes one of the jurors!" he exclaimed.

Jurors in France are not escorted by uniformed policemen and every night they return to their homes in complete freedom, having taken the oath "not to discuss the case with anyone." They are chosen with more rapidity than in either America or England.

The prosecution and the defense have 12 peremptory challenges each and no more. Thus 36 names chosen from the electoral list of the department are thrown into a hat and 12 are picked out. Should the prosecution and the defense both choose to exercise their prerogative of challenging 12 jurors, there always remains enough names in the hat to swear in a jury. The Landru jury was chosen in 15 minutes. Neither the prosecution nor the defense challenged a single juror.

"You swear to testify without hatred or fear, to tell the whole truth and nothing but the truth; raise your right hand and say: 'I swear it,'" says the judge to the witness as the latter advances to the bar. There is no Bible in evidence.

"Tell your own story," continues the judge, and the witness goes on to relate how he or she met Landru in the company of Madame Cuchet, Guillou or Heon during the year 1916.

"Didn't you swear that Madame So and So told you that she was to be married to Landru, when you appeared before the investigating magistrate?" asks the judge.

"Is he the prosecuting attorney?" Inquired a South Boston man as Judge Gilbert was berating Landru for seven previous convictions for swindling, forgery and other crimes.

No stenographer was present in the court and no notes were taken in shorthand of the various testimonies heard, so that the question of interpretation of a testimony was left to the good or bad memory of the prosecution and defense.
