## Relief For Fish Hatcheries Urged

SALEM, Dec. 21.—Rehabilitation of eleven fish hatcheries and ponds badly damaged by the recent statewide storm is the aim of house bill No. 6, which provides for an emergency appropriation of \$64,500 to be credited to hatchery fund districts Nos. 1 and 2.

The fish commission, which sponsored the bill, points out that unless the legislature passes the measure the industry will be set back so materially that recovery will be almost impossible. Many of the hatcheries and ponds were completely wiped out, according to members of the commission.

"Ponds at Eagle creek and Tanner creek were entirely swept out by the rigors of the recent storm," said Representative E. N. Hurd of Clatsop county, who introduced the bill. "The fish industry is one of the largest in the state. Hundreds of men and women are employed and it would be criminal not to vote funds for the rebuilding and restoration of the hatcheries."

Hatcheries along the Trask river, Alsea at Tidewater, Tillamook, Bonnaville, Clatskanie, Santiam, Umpgun and Siletz were all damaged, in addition to the Eagle and Tanner creek ponds.

The bill provides that the state treasurer draw warrants for the amount on the state treasury, payable out of the general fund. The sum of \$21,000 is to be allotted to hatchery fund district No. 1 and \$43,500 to hatchery fund district No. 2.

## Fleets In Nevada; Palms In Alaska

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(United Press.)—Alaska was once a land of sunshine and flowers. Ferns and palms, such as now thrive in lands far to the south, once flourished in the sub-tropical climate of her valleys and lowlands.

But that was millions of years ago before man existed, according to the United States Geological Survey, which has made a study of the fossil flora. Deep down in the coal beds have been found fossils of plants, which indicate that Alaska was, ages ago, a land of luxuriant loveliness.

Dusky savages of a remote past, or perhaps members of that enlightened race of cliff-dwellers, once looked across the waters of a huge

lake in what is now northwestern Nevada.

Rude fleets perhaps wended their way in a primitive commerce across the great inland sea, which once spread over 8,500 square miles, also according to the survey.

Geologists have given the great body of water, which was present in "comparatively recent geologic time" the name of Lake Lahontan, in honor of Baron La Hontan, one of the early explorers of the head waters of the Mississippi River.

The deepest part of Lake Lahontan, 880 feet, was the site of the present Pyramid Lake, a small remnant, so that its surface stood about 590 feet above the surface of Pyramid Lake.

A field of sand dunes, formed since the inland sea disappeared, now cover a large area a few miles north of Winnemucca, Nevada. The dunes are gradually moving eastward, and

their steady march has necessitated a number of changes in the roads in recent years. In some places telegraph poles have been buried so deep that they have had to be spliced in order to keep the wires above the crests of the sand dunes.
