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First impressions are usually lasting, and you should no more think of representing your business with ill-arranged, poorly printed stationery than with an uncouth, inexperienced salesman. The psychological effect would be the same.

Legion Says Bonus Bill Will Be Enacted

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 28.—(United Press.)—National Commander MacNider of the American Legion today stated that he had assurance that the World's War Veterans bonus bill, now in Congress, would pass Congress and go into effect in July, 1922. His assurance, he said, came from Senator McCumber, N. D., and Rep. Fordney, Mich., sponsors of the bill in the Senate and House respectively.

1. Adjusted service pay, at the rate of \$1 a day for home service and \$1.25 for foreign service. Maximum of \$500 for man without overseas service; \$625 for man with overseas service.

2. Adjusted service certificate (so-called insurance policy), a paid-up 20-year endowment policy. The face value of this policy will be 3-338 times the amount that would be received in cash. The face value of this policy would be payable to the veteran at the end of 20 years, the face value would be paid to the beneficiary of the policy. Loan values are also provided for.

3. Vocational training aid of \$1.25 a day while taking a course in vocational training. The amount thus paid in no case would exceed 140 per cent of what would have been paid in cash.

4. Farm or home aid, 140 per cent of what would be paid under option No. 1. If the money is used to purchase, improve or make payments on approved farm or city or suburban home.

5. Land settlement. (A) Provides for the establishment of reclamation projects for the development and improvement of vacant land. This may be government land or may be land purchased by the government. If possible, project will be located in each state, the state paying part of the purchase price of private lands bought for this purpose. Ex-service men to be employed on the project as far as possible. (B) Provides for the sale of farm units on these projects when they are ready for settlement. Sale price is to include purchase price of land plus cost of improvement. Terms, part down, rest in 40 years at 5 per cent interest.

(C) Veterans may have their adjusted service pay applied as first payment on this land.

The Legion refers to the bill as the adjusted compensation measure, claiming that the term "bonus bill" is unjust to the men who will profit by the investment.

Section of Fair Bill is Overlooked

SALEM, Dec. 28.—It was discovered here last night that in enrolling house bill No. 22, which is a part of the special session of the legislature, there was omitted a portion of the senate amendment which authorized a share of the funds raised for exposition purposes to be apportioned to the various counties of the state for co-exhibition purposes.

That part of the senate amendment which was omitted in enrolling the original bill follows: "Said 10 per cent shall be apportioned among the various counties of this state as follows: To Multnomah county, \$30,000; to each other county of the state \$5,000; the remainder of the said 10 per cent shall be divided among the respective county courts of the state except Multnomah county, proportionately in the ratio that the number of registered motor vehicles (not including motorcycles) in each of said participating counties on December 31, 1921, bears to the total registered vehicles (not including motorcycles) of all the participating counties. Multnomah county being excluded. For the purposes of this proviso the board of county commissioners of any county whose fiscal affairs are managed by such board shall be deemed to be included in the term 'county court'."

This bill has been sent to Roy Riner, president of the senate, for his signature. It was said here last night that the part of the senate amendment omitted from the enrollment bill probably will be inserted before any court action is started to compel President Riner to sign the measure and return it to Governor Olcott for approval.

Drinks Be Minus Twenty Years Hence

COLUSA, Cal., Dec. 27.—(United Press.)—In twenty or thirty years it will be almost impossible to get a drink.

Thus the seer of the Colusa Herald is moved to muse by the recent passage of a Little Volstead law by the city.

By that time, of course, we'll most of us be dead—which will make things a little easier, perhaps.

they get and at last they will not want it at all. This will be in ten, twenty or thirty years."

Franklin Lane Admired Nat. Parks

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—(United Press.)—Here is one of our greatest parks," wrote Franklin K. Lane of country in Mount Rainier national park, where a peak will be named for him, according to a recent decision of the U. S. geographic board.

The announcement of this decision lends interest to his eulogy of the locality as written in a communication not long before his death to the National Geographic society.

"The dominant feature in the landscape of the state of Washington," wrote Lane, "is Mount Rainier. I like the name Tacoma because it is an Indian name. Rainier was the name of an admiral who saw this splendid place. Tacoma was the Indian name and means 'the feeding breast' and when you see the mountain you will realize where the Indians got that name, because from every side come down rivers which made for the strength, beauty and wealth of the country."

"Here is one of our great parks, and I have stood therein with the snow of the glacier in one hand and touched with the other the blossoming wild flowers."

Removal of War Tax Will Help Public

The public will save approximately \$1,500,000 a month as a result of the elimination of the war tax on express shipments, according to George C. Taylor, president of the American Railway Express company. An announcement to this effect was made today by J. E. Dent, the local express agent.

The "Revenue Act of 1921" eliminates the war tax of one cent on every express shipment and transportation thereof in transportation charges on all express shipments. This has during the year of 1920 amounted to \$17,500,000.

The average transportation charge for each express shipment was approximately 15 cents and the average war tax for each shipment was eight cents. The elimination of the tax, therefore, Mr. Taylor states, will virtually amount to a decrease in rates of a little over five

per cent. Mr. Taylor believes that this should have a tendency to stimulate business and thereby accelerate the rapidly improving conditions throughout the entire country.

"The American Railway Express company handles approximately one million shipments a day or nearly four hundred million shipments a year," Mr. Taylor goes on to say. "The elimination of the tax will relieve the American Railway Express company of an immense amount of labor which has been involved in calculating, entering on waybills and collection of tax, not the mention of the expense of checking and accounting on bills."

The Treasury Department has requested express carriers to advise all claimants who have claims pending, for overcharges, or who file such claims after December 31st, 1921, that claims for refund of tax should be filed separately on Treasury Department form No. 46, with the commissioner of internal revenue within four years from the time tax was paid, claim being barred by statute of limitation if received after such time."

Mr. J. E. Dent pointed out that as the Revenue Act becomes effective January 1st, 1922, the tax on all shipments forwarded "prepaid" on or before December 31st, will be collected. On shipments forwarded "collect" and arriving on or after January 1st, the tax will not be assessed.
