The dress problem for the woman of limited income sometimes seems overwhelming, but if she has a bit of ingenuity this trouble may soon become a simple matter. For this year above all others, there are many hints for a slight transformation in the existing wardrobe.

Betty Compson, starring in Penrhyn Stanlaw's Paramount picture, "The Little Minister," by J. M. Barrie, has many suggestions to make. She claims that a radical change, and a beautiful one, may be easily made in an old-fashioned frock, simply by the purchase of some oriental brocade that may be patterned into an attractive shawl collar, as shown here.

The type of collars and cuffs sketched at the top also adds a distinctive touch. These are most successful if made in bright colors, embroidered with beads. Then, too, the old-fashioned lace collar has also made its reappearance.

Never have the girdles assumed such attention. Never have braided ribbons, like the one shown in the sketch, been lovelier. Such a girdle will add chic and charm to a black frock of velvet.

Something new in trimmings, but not in design, is the frock sketched at the left. It is of black serge and trimmed with bands of black braid and long fringes, with the string belt of the material. The long waist is a definite feature of the new mode.

AMERICA LOANS MONEY

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Jan. 1.—The American loan of \$12,000,000 to Queensland is merely a prelude to an important financial transaction between the United States and Queensland, according to the opinion expressed today in well-informed circles here.

It was pointed out that Premier Theodore of Queensland contemplates a trip to America soon, to raise a additional loan, primarily for the equipping of the Brisbane tramways and the establishment of state steel and iron works at Bowen.

Although it is believed that the loan can be obtained in America at an interest rate of the recent loan, it is considered doubtful whether Premier Theodore, despite the need of his government for financial aid, would be prepared to pay the 7 per cent rate of the former obligation.

Very little of the \$12,000,000 loan will be available for expenditure in Queensland where London commitments have been met, it was said.

Red Cross Makes Good Gains

December has been an active month in Douglas county Red Cross chapter activities. The campaign to renew the annual memberships has been put on all over the county and a great deal of time and energetic effort has been spent to secure sufficient funds to carry on the chapter's enlarged program for 1922. To date there has been approximately \$1,000 turned in but some of the larger towns have not made a return. Half of this money will be spent in Douglas county for the care of ex-service men and their families and civilian relief.

The correspondence during the month of December has been the heaviest in several months, and the board of directors have held two meetings and outlined very definite working plans for the extension of the civilian relief work. Miss Agnes Fitchford, the present juvenile officer and a member of the board of directors, will leave the first of the year to take a short intensive course to fit her to follow out the plans which have been outlined by the board, and will work in cooperation with the county court.

Transportation and a re-examination has been furnished a local boy and by having his disability rating increased he will now receive a higher rating of compensation.

There are a large number of ex-service men on the road who find it absolutely impossible to secure work, and the Douglas county chapter has taken care of a good many of them by furnishing a bed over night and supper and breakfast, and most of them have continued on their way.

A statement has been given to all the county papers emphatically denying the use of any Red Cross funds in rendering assistance to any persons convicted of a crime and now confined in the state penitentiary. This unjust attack upon the Red Cross by those not sufficiently informed has done considerable damage and has materially retarded the membership campaign. These papers

ANCIENT CITY HAD BAR ROOMS

Discoveries in Pompeii Prove That the Serving of Drinks Was a Recognized Occupation.

Three score years after the birth of Christ the busy and beautiful little city of Pompeii, overlooking the Bay of Naples, with its 20,000 inhabitants was dramatically blotted out of existence by an eruption of the long dormant Vesuvius, and for 17 centuries lay unknown beneath a thick shroud of volcanic refuse, remarks the Toronto Mail and Empire.

About the middle of the Eighteenth century the grave of the dead city was accidentally discovered and subsequent excavations have slowly revealed the rare treasures of a departed civilization. New excavations were begun in 1911, but with the great war of 1914 the world had something more important to think about than Pompeii. Nevertheless, the antiquarians continued quietly digging and discovering fresh wonders. A few weeks ago the London Times correspondent in Rome wrote an interesting description of the latest findings, among them being a great fresco, with painting of the 12 penates (custodians) of the city—Jupiter, Juno, Mars, Minerva, Hercules, Venus, Mercury, Proserpine, Vulcan, Ceres, Apollo and Diana.

But to the people of North America the most absorbing discovery will be that of a bar, or thermopolium, where drinks were served out to parched Pompeians. There were many terra cotta amphorae found—and an amphora, gentle reader, is a sort of glorified "schooner." At the end of the bar was a small furnace and a caldron with a lid for mixing what Mr. Dooley termed "hot wans." Within the caldron the excavators found the remains of some of the liquid used.

Effective Fog Signals. In a heavy fog there is danger of collision between ships because the uniform signals used merely indicate their presence, and tell nothing of their course or direction. A sea captain of long experience has now devised a system which overcomes this difficulty, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. Four signal horns of different tones are used, two sirens, a shrill whistle, and a steam gong, all of which are operated by foot levers.

Each of these corresponds to one quadrant of the compass, and is operated only when the ship's course lies in that general direction. The four divisions of the quadrant itself are indicated by varying the signals, as, for example, one long blast, a long and short, a long and two short, and two long. A recording mechanism is connected to the signal equipment and serves as evidence in case of subsequent question as to the handling of the ship.

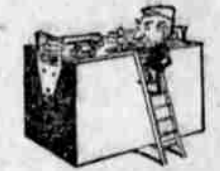
