PROHIBITION SUCCESS, REPORT SAYS

Enforcement is Rigid in Nine-Tenths of the United States It is Found.

CRIME IS ON DECREASE

Eighty-five Per Cent Less Liquor is Consumed in Country Now Than Before Prohibition Accord ing to Report.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—Prohibition is excellently enforced in nine-tenths of the area of the country and in the remainder is sufficiently well enforced to be a very great improvement over the license system.

This is the result of an investigation covering several months through official channels and direct inquiry as announced today by Dr. Deets Pickett, research secretary of the Board of Prohibition, Temperance, and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal church. The organization of the church was used as one of the agencies of information, which was obtained from 20,000 heads of churches and with numerous leaders of the 10,000,000 lay adherents. The statement includes no figures not personally verified, Dr. Pickett stated.

The investigation showed that "there has been an enormous decrease in the consumption of liquor, a decrease not less than eighty-five and possibly more than ninety per cent," according to Dr. Pickett. "This has resulted in a very large decrease in the number of arrests for drunkenness and a very considerable increase in the purchasing power of the poor and of the skilled and unskilled laborers," says the report. "In San Francisco, prohibition decreased arrests for drunkenness in its first year from 17,354 to 1,814. In Los Angeles, from 15,830 to 2,589. In Boston, it was from 52,652 to 16,487. In Baltimore, in the last wet October, there were 1,195 arrests for drunkenness, and in the first dry October, 193. We have similar reports from the heads of police of Washington, St. Paul, Lincoln, Galveston, St. Louis, and other cities.

"The fact of increased purchasing power is attested by signed statements of the secretaries of chambers of commerce, real estate dealers, furniture and musical instrument dealers and merchants of many kinds.

"There has also been a large decrease in petty crimes. In Boston, prohibition brought about a decrease in the number of cases of assault from 2,127 to 1,673 in one year. In St. Louis, petty larceny declined from 5,167 to 3,503.

"There has also been a decrease in more serious crimes in many cities. The wet prohibitionists have spoken much of a crime wave in New York. It was the authority of the commissioner of police of the city of New York, that in 1918 there were 11,611 burglaries, and in 1920 only 6,839. He makes similar statements as to commissions of crime of serious nature on other charges.

"Even better results have been obtained in rural and small town districts.

"There has been a startling decrease in poverty and financial distress. The hospitals have been relieved. In Philadelphia, in six months of the last wet year there were 1,184 cases of alcoholism in general hospitals and in the same months of the next year, 276. Similar reports have been received from other cities.

"It is frequently stated by alcohol propagandists that there is in the United States enormous illicit distillation, that nearly every family makes alcohol. Obviously, this is simply an expression of opinion. In America, only a few families of German extraction know how to make palatable beer. Whiskey, illicitly produced, is so nearly non-palatable that only habitual alcoholics can consume it. Private distillation and brewing, while it worries the prohibition officers by necessitating many arrests, is an insignificant factor.

"Prohibition is a relative success now, and is on the road to complete success."

New Year to be Ushered by Prayer

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Millions of Christians throughout the world will join in an almost universal week of prayer for the period January 1-7. In almost every country of the earth a volume of prayer will ascend from the same objects and the same purpose.

As this story is read in America on December 31, the week of prayer will already have begun in the Pacific ocean. As the sun moves westward carrying the break of the new day and the New Year to the Far Eastern nations, services of prayer will be held. It is probable that watch-night services will circle the globe and when the final ones are held in the Hawaiian Islands it will be almost time for the second of January to dawn along the line in the Pacific where the day begins.

The call to prayer was sent out by the World Evangelical Alliance with headquarters in London. For three-quarters of a century the Evangelical churches everywhere have joined in special periods of prayer on common subjects. In America the call was issued on behalf of the Alliance by the Commission on Evangelism and Life Service of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

Owing to the world-wide interest aroused by the Washington conference on limitation of armament, it is believed that the call will be more widely observed than ever before. The World Evangelical Alliance announces that arrangements have been completed for great services of prayer in the Philippines, in Japan, in Peking, in Calcutta, in Jerusalem, in Europe, in North and South America and in the possessions of Great Britain and the United States. The topics for the various days are:

Sunday, January 1—Prayer.
Monday, January 2—Thanksgiving and confession.
Tuesday, January 3—The church universal.
Wednesday, January 4—The nations and their leaders.
Thursday, January 5—Foreign missions.
Friday, January 6—Christian education and the Christian home.
Saturday, January 7—Home missions.

Hope Alike For Fat and Lean

LONDON, Dec. 31.—(United Press).—Much excitement has been aroused here over the news from Schleiberg, Germany, that Prussian farmers have devised ways of extracting fat from live pigs, so as to have the pig and eat it too.

Papers printed photographs showing pigs "before and after." When the pig had been properly fattened, it was said, it was taken to a veterinarian who administered a local anesthetic, removed a section of fat, sewed up the porker, tied on a large bandage and sent it home for more fattening.

Interviews with prominent English raisers of pigs revealed that this method had not yet been tried in England and probably would not, because of its roughness on the pig.

Considerable speculation was aroused, however, some persons thinking that the operation might be a useful adjunct to the monkey-stand operation. Bay windows, it was pointed out, could be removed, thus completing the renovation. Beauty specialists were also asked their advice as to whether such an idea might be used to help the fashions in women's shapes, introducing real fat instead of bustles, or having the fat removed instead of prohibiting milked milks and potatoes.

A skeptic has, however, given these revolutionary ideas a set-back. He observed that the name of the German village mentioned means in English, "Sneaking fat."

Trout Fishing Law Explained

There seems to be considerable confusion in the mind of the public in regard to what interpretation should be given to the law regulating winter fishing in the Umpqua river and its tributaries. The law, as it applies to our section of the state, and which is known as Game District No. 1, is as follows:

"Trout, open season from April 15 to November 30. Bag limit, thirty fish, or twenty pounds and one fish in any one day, and sixty fish or forty pounds and one fish in any seven consecutive days; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful to have in possession more than sixty fish or forty pounds and one fish at one time; provided further, there shall be an open season for trout over ten inches in length in the waters of the Pacific ocean and all the bays, inlets and streams affected by the tide water thereof, during the months of December, January, February, March and April of each year."

Now the part of this section which is confusing is the part which reads: "Provided, further, there shall be an open season for trout over ten inches in length in the waters of the Pacific ocean and all the bays, inlets and streams affected by the tide water thereof during the months of December, January, February, March and April of each year."

This means that you can winter fish for trout over ten inches in length only in the Umpqua river and its two main forks, not in the tributaries and streams flowing into it; therefore all winter fishing in the streams of Douglas county is prohibited by law, except the Umpqua river, which is the only stream we have that is affected by tide water, and anyone catching fish during these winter months in any of the tributaries of the Umpqua river is subject to arrest and fine.

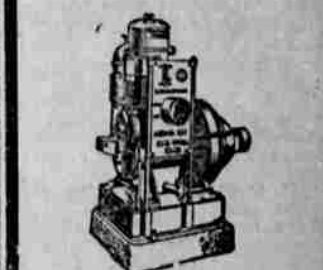
