Sutherland to Have Best Water System

SUTHERLIN, Ore., Jan. 4.—Sutherland is now practically assured one of the best water systems of any town of its size in the state. Drilling on the six deep wells on the north side of town was completed last week, and after making a careful test it was demonstrated that the wells will furnish between eighty and one hundred thousand gallons of water daily, more than sufficient to supply the present needs of the community. The wells are over one hundred feet deep, and the water is of excellent quality. A pipe line is now being laid from the wells to the city reservoir on the north side of town, from which place the water will be distributed through the city mains. A 25 horsepower engine, now owned by the city, will furnish the power to operate the pumps at the wells, and the building on the west side of the railroad, formerly used as a pumping station, will be moved to the location of the new wells. Mayor Bethwell and members of the city council are to be congratulated for their efforts to secure a good supply of pure water for Sutherland.

JACKSON HEAD OF WILSON AWARD FOR THIS STATE

Oregon is to have a leading part in the movement to honor former President Woodrow Wilson and to perpetuate his ideals through the Woodrow Wilson Foundation. C. S. Jackson, of Portland, publisher of the Oregon Journal, as state chairman, is perfecting plans for the opening, on January 16, of a campaign through which will be raised this state's share of an endowment fund of at least \$1,000,000. The income of

this fund will be used by the Foundation to make periodic awards to the "individual or group that has rendered, within a specified time, meritorious service to democracy, public welfare, liberal thought or peace through justice." Associated with the chairman in this work are many of the state's most prominent men and women.

The idea of establishing a Foundation to perpetuate the ideals of the former President originated among a group of women who met at the home of Mrs. Charles L. Tiffany, of New York, Christmas, 1920, and was expanded through conferences with the friends of Mr. Wilson. Under the direction of Franklin D. Roosevelt, chairman of the National Committee of the Foundation and Assistant Secretary of the Navy and President Wilson; Cleveland H. Dodge, chairman of the Executive Committee and classmate of Mr. Wilson at Princeton; and Hamilton Holt, executive director, organization of the Foundation throughout the United States has been practically completed.

January 16 has been designated as the date when subscriptions to the fund will be taken. In the meantime substantial subscriptions are being received at national headquarters, 120 Nassau Street, New York.

When the fund has been raised it will be invested in securities of the United States Government or in other approved trust fund securities and will be under the management of a Board of Trustees to the number of fifteen nationally representative men and women, who will disburse the income annually to the Jury of Awards. The awards will be comparable in significance to the Nobel Prize. Headquarters for Oregon have been opened in the Oregon Journal Building, Portland.

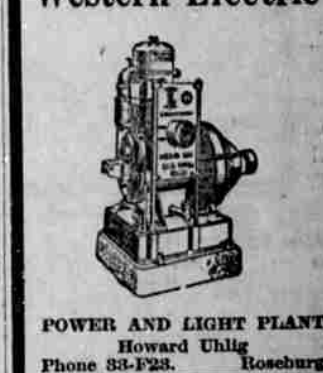
