Major Opie Makes a Denial

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Major H. L. Opie, Staunton, Va., broke down and wept bitterly yesterday as he denied to the senate investigating committee charges that he shot and killed two of his soldiers in France. Opie denied in detail the charges lodged against him by former privates of the A. E. F., that he killed a runner and shot down in cold blood Wilker Woolwine, Winchester, Va., in a shell hole.

The witness, who smoked incessantly and trembled visibly as numerous witnesses testified against him, while others defended him, maintained his composure with difficulty during the first few minutes on the stand. His voice broke suddenly and he cried as he told of his decorations for distinguished service.

Makes Denial.

Opie said he had received the distinguished service cross, the croix de guerre with two palms and the French Legion of Honor.

Opie faced the committee and pounded his fist on the table as he entered denial of the charges.

"The accusations come from diseased minds," he declared. "There is not an iota of truth in them."

Opie admitted he fired a rifle on October 8, 1918, to stop a retreat, but said he shot behind the men.

Six former privates who served in France under Major Opie took the stand this afternoon and pronounced him innocent of charges that he shot down two American soldiers in the Argonne forest.

Witness after witness branded the charges as utterly unfounded. Several said they were with Opie virtually all the time on the days he is alleged to have shot the men, and that such acts by him could not have been possible without their knowledge.

Defends Major.

Charles F. Cox, Lynchburg, Va., testified he was near Opie at all times on October 8 and 9, 1918, that he did not see Opie "fire a shot at anything."

Howard Pifer, Staunton, Va., said that on October 8 and 9 he saw Opie fire several shots into the air to stop a group of stragglers.

"Opie did not aim at the soldiers," he said, "and no one fell."

Dr. Frederick Vashbrough of Gardfield, N. J., gave similar testimony. Rev. John Hill, Baltimore, former lieutenant colonel, said he investigated Opie's conduct at the front to see if it warranted his being decorated for valor.

"I took the enlisted men in Opie's command aside and asked them to tell me in confidence what they thought of Opie's record," Hill said. "Their reports were uniformly to Opie's credit. Had he shot any of his men I would have heard of it."
