Hatcheries to Be Self Sustaining

SALEM, Jan. 6.—Governor Olcott today affixed his signature to house bill 6 appropriating \$64,000 for the repair of damages to fish hatcheries in departments number one and two caused by the November storm.

The governor's approval of the appropriation followed a promise on the part of Chris Schmidt, commissioner of the state fish commission, that never again would the state legislature be asked for another cent for hatchery purposes.

This pledge on the part of the fish commission is contained in a lengthy statement to the governor explaining the nature of the damage sustained by the hatcheries in the two departments and setting out that unless the appropriation bill was approved operation of the hatchery in

department No. 1, comprising the Columbia river and its tributaries, would be seriously impaired while the hatcheries in district No. 2 would have to shut down completely.

"The fish commission appreciates the fact that there is growing up in the state a sentiment in favor of placing the salmon industry on a self-sustaining basis. With this sentiment the fish commission is in hearty accord," the statement of the commission to the governor reads.

"At the last regular session of the legislature a revenue measure was introduced, passed and approved by the governor, providing for a poundage fee to be paid upon the catch of all gear licensed by the state. This, however, has proved inadequate and it will be necessary at the next regular session of the legislature to present another bill increasing the license fees throughout to such an extent that the industry itself and the operations of the department will be upon a self-sustaining basis.

"The fish commission has authorized me to say to you that it will not appear before the legislature in future years for appropriations for the operations of the hatchery department. It should be understood, however, that the master fish warden's department, which is a law enforcing arm of the state government, has been for many years past sustained by the state, and properly so, thus making it subservient to the state instead of the industry. The law creating this department provides for the funds being appropriated from the general fund of the state. This amounts to not more than \$15,000 annually, the last appropriation I believe, being \$29,000 for the biennium."

Huggins Famed Champion Trader In Major League

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Miller Huggins is perhaps the greatest trader in the major leagues. Since the manager took hold of the New York Yankees and while he was hoisting the St. Louis Cardinals, he has figured in six big deals each involving seven or more players.

His first big swap was made in 1914 when he turned Knott, Mowrey and Marmon over to the Pirates for Jack Miller, Butler, Dolan, Wilson and Robertson. In 1919 he started the succession of big deals that eventually gave him the championship of the American League when he gave Cullip, Shocker, Nunn, Maken, Maisei and Gedeon to the St. Louis Browns for Platt and Plank. Later in the same season he traded Love, Walters, Caldwell and Gilhooly to the Red Sox for Lewis, Shore and Leonard.

In 1920 he traded Pratt, Vick, Thormahlen and Ruel to the Red Sox for Schlang, Hoyt, Harper and McNally.

Before the 1921 race he sent Shore, McGraw, Smallwood, Hannah, Hyatt and Love to Vernon for Johnny Mitchell and traded Lefty O'Doul to San Francisco for Love and Corham. His last big move sent Peckinpaugh, Quinn, Piercy and Collins to the Red Sox for Cocott, Bush and Jones.

As the team stands now there is not a single player remaining of the club that Huggins took over when he assumed the management of the

Yanks. Peck was the last survivor of the old band to go.

New York did not take kindly to the deal that sent Peck away, as he was almost as close to the heart of the fans as George Burns, the Giant veteran who was traded away to Cincinnati. However, the fans did not come out as critical as they did over the Burns deal, because they figure the Yanks got more out of the trade for Peck than the Giants got for Burns.

The year 1816 was the year without a summer. In that year the sun spots were at a maximum.

Old records say that the opening months of this anomalous year—January and February—were mild, but March turned cold. April started out warm, but before it ended the fields in the northern United States were stiffened with frost and whitened with snow. The cold continued throughout May, ice forming an inch thick, and repeated plantings of seed being successively destroyed, until farmers gave up in despair. June gave no relief, ice continuing to be formed on the streams and ponds and snow to be sprinkled over the fields. "Almost every green thing was killed; fruit nearly all destroyed; snow fell to the depth of ten inches in Vermont, seven in Maine, three in the interior of New York and also in Massachusetts."

Olcott Vetoes 1925 Fair Bills

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5.—There will be no special election in Oregon on May 19, with the sanction of the Oregon 1925 exposition committee.

Governor Olcott today vetoed house bill 31, which provided for a special election to be held May 19, coincident with the regular primary elections. His veto message calls attention to the grave doubt as to whether the exposition measures actually had passed the legislature and to the fact that the other measure which house bill 31 would place upon the ballot is a local one affecting only Linn and Benton counties. Further the governor mentions that it was the intention of the legislature to embody a saving clause in the bill to the effect that the entire bill would be void in case the exposition bills were found invalid, but that this saving clause was omitted.

Governor Points Out Folly. "It would be folly," says the governor, "to allow this bill to become a law and to further allow the election to proceed with the possibility of but one measure coming before the people at that time, and that measure being a local one, affecting Benton and Linn counties only."

The veto disposes of the last of the bills sent to the governor by the legislature.

The resolution authorized an increased gasoline tax with which to provide funds to finance the proposed 1925 exposition in Portland. The enabling act provided for putting the world's fair machinery in motion. The special election measure was fathered by Representative Korrell of Multnomah county, and carried an appropriation of \$15,000.

Earlier today Governor Olcott approved house bill 6, the measure appropriating \$64,500 for the repair of equipment of the state fish commission that was damaged by the November storm. The commission, prior to the governor's signing the measure, pledged itself not to ask subsequent legislature for appropriations for the hatchery department.
