Chess Attracts Eyes of Public

CHAS. FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—(Unit-Press.)—Chess, the king of indoor sports, is rapidly picking up in the interest of the public. Interest is increasing rapidly. A number of exhibitions have been held lately at the Mechanics Institute—the chess playing center of the city. The increased interest and activity in the game is largely due, chess fans believe, to the recent visit of "mummy" the Polish boy wonder, to the coast. He played a number of exhibitions here at a department store, and the exhibitions were witnessed by hundreds of people in addition to

the usual chess fans who would naturally be there. "It is surprising the number of people who know how to play chess," one expert declared. "As a matter of fact, a great many people have played at one time or another, and have let their games lapse for one reason or another—usually because they did not happen to be with others who played. However such an institution as the Mechanics Institute gives every lover of chess a chance to practice, and to exercise his skill. The game is growing by leaps and bounds." Similar reports have been received according to chess fans, from Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle, and other coast points. It is also reported from public libraries that chess books, especially Staunton's handbook, and Cook's Compendium, and Morphy's games, have been in larger demand than ever before.

The return to "book chess" is a highly favorable sign, according to experts, who hope to see a great improvement in the game among amateurs, who previously played, but were not especially familiar with the accepted openings. A recent match held here broke a record for time—taking eight hours. Fans are again thinking of hanging on to the old sign "Rooters bring mattresses."

TO RETURN EVANS TO PENITENTIARY

SALEM, Jan. 7.—Abe Evans, condemned slayer of James Doran of Wasco county, now temporarily detained in the ward for criminal insane at the state hospital, wants to get back to his old quarters in murderer's row at the state prison, according to Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the hospital.

Evans also wanted to die, according to Steiner. Evans desires to return to his prison cell is based upon the friendships which he made with guards and fellow convicts while in the penitentiary he says.

According to Steiner, Evans complains of severe headaches and wants to die to get out of his misery. Physicians at the state hospital who have been asked for an opinion as to Evans' sanity are watching him closely every day and are seeking data as to his past behavior in order to enable them to arrive at a conclusion as to his mental condition.
