

Important Ring Battle Scheduled

PARIS, Jan. 7.—One of the most important ring battles staged here in a decade is set for Jan. 9, when Eugene Crichton, the "knockout king," meets Charlie Ledoux in a 20-round encounter for the bantamweight championship of Europe, now held by Ledoux.

Should Charlie Ledoux be returned the winner he will journey to America where he has signed up to meet Joe Lynch, Joe Burman, Pete Herman and Johnny Buff. If Crichton wins the fight, Ledoux plans to retire immediately.

The purse is largest ever offered for a pugilistic encounter in France, being 300,000 francs, which will be divided, 70 per cent to the winner, 30 to the loser. When Jack Johnson met Frank Moran here in 1914, the stakes amounted to 200,000 francs, which has not yet been paid as owing to legal entanglements.

MOISTURE IS FUEL SAVER

CORVALLIS, Jan. 7.—Fuel may be saved by increasing the amount of water vapor in the atmosphere of a home, according to Miss Emma Weld, instructor in the household art department at the Oregon Agricultural college. The lower temperature in which it is possible to live comfortably when the amount of water vapor in the air is increased, is also more healthful, she explained.

"An average temperature of 64 to 65 degrees has been shown to be best for the human race," said Miss Weld. "The skin is more healthful at this temperature, the body more hardy and the constitution better able to resist disease. Experiments conducted in the New York schools a few years ago proved this fact conclusively."

"A large amount of water in the air, or a high humidity, makes a person feel as warm at 64 degrees as he would in dry air at 70 or 72 degrees. Moisture does not evaporate quickly from the body and heat is thus saved in the body as well as coal for the furnace."

The last big swap in which the Yanks took Scott, Jones and Bush away from the Red Sox for Peckinpaugh, Quinn, Piercy and Collins gave the New Yorkers almost an entire Boston team. On the roster of the club, those formerly under allegiance to Harry Frazee are Babe Ruth, Carl Mays, Walter Hoyt, Wally Schang, Mike McNally, Harry Harper, Scott, Bush and Jones.

Former Yanks on the Boston club are Peck, Pratt, Vlek, Ruel, Walters, Thormahlen, Russell, Quinn, Collins, Piercy and Foster.

Boston thinks that the many deals did nothing but help swell the roll of Frazee and the fact remains that the Yanks are league champions and the Red Sox are second division calibre. It is an interesting feature of the last deal that the Yanks now have all the pitchers that Ed Barrow used in the 1918 world's series, when the

Red Sox were playing the Chicago Cubs.

Ruth won two games in the series and Mays won a pair. Bush finished one of the games credited to Ruth and lost the only one he started. Sam Jones lost his only start also in a close game against Jim Vaughn.

Gardiner Mill Will Soon Start

REEDSPORT, Jan. 7.—Rumor has it that \$10,000 are being expended on the Gardiner Mill plant under the direction of William Jewett, who has a force of men now engaged in preparing the mill for operation in January.

The roof of the mill is being repaired and re-roofed in places that are necessary, and this work is about completed. In addition the company is buying a large shipment of machinery, which is expected to be on the ground and installed some time this week.

The mill will operate for some time on logs which the Gardiner Mill company have on hand, those left over from the surplus when the plant was closed down. The company has a camp on Smith river, which can be opened on short notice, if more logs are needed.

The product of the mill will be shipped by both rail and water cargoes, according to the manufacturers and owners of the company.

According to the progress of the repairing work now being done, the mill should be ready to start by the middle of this month and perhaps sooner.

With the opening of the mill at Gardiner, all the sawmills on the Lower Unipqua will be in operation, which will give employment to many men in both Reedport and Gardiner. The mill when running to a full capacity will employ about 40 men.

The Gardiner mill is the oldest mill on the Lower Unipqua, being built for many years. The mill has been laying idle for about two years.

Sees Dead Son After Long Trip

MARSHFIELD, Jan. 6.—Fellopo Gonzales, bringing with him his 16 year old son, came all the way from the far interior of Mexico, a trip which required three months of seeing whether or not his son, Liborio Gonzales, a victim of the Beaver Hill mine fire, had been properly buried.

Gonzales was burned and injured with fifteen others when a gas explosion occurred in the mine. He died as a result after being in the hospital for a time. Word was sent to the father and it was learned that the latter lived about 200 miles away from the nearest telegraph office.

The word finally reached the home and the father with the younger son started for Marshfield. The wife of the man who died here lives at home here having been left at the father's home while Gonzales came north to work and make money.

A wonderful surprise awaited the father when he reached here. It had been three months since the death and on account of the distance and the many difficulties in getting through the country and delays in passports the father was a long time coming. He, of course, expected to find that his son had been buried but such was not the case.

The body of Gonzales had been embalmed and although dead for three months was in a good state of preservation, and was held at the Wilson undertaking establishment pending further word. The father was told that he could see his dead son. He could not understand. On seeing the body he at once recognized the son, but could not understand how it had been arranged, and was amazed.

Tunnel Ventilation Tried.

The test of the ventilation system in a model vehicular tunnel, a replica of the proposed Hudson River tunnel from New York to Jersey City, conducted at the experimental mine of the United States bureau of mines at Bruncton, near Pittsburgh, was considered a success by the bureau's officials and members of the New Jersey Bridge and Tunnel commission who attended.

Experiments were made to determine the effects of motor exhaust gases, the heat and the smoke, and the best methods of eliminating all such effects on motorists in tunnels.

Tate won on a foul over Wills here last Monday afternoon in the first round of a scheduled ten round bout.

The two heavyweights fought over again tonight and all of the fans who attended the first go were admitted free. More than five thousand jammed the arena.

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—Sporting writers here consider Tate now the colored heavyweight champion because he won on a technicality Monday and broke even last night. Wills manager protested, holding that last night's free show superseded and wiped out Monday's affair, which should not count.

Unique Football Game at Oxford

OXFORD, Jan. 7.—The "new men" beat the "old men" by a score of six to nothing recently in the annual intercollegiate football game played by Americans in Oxford university. The University Parks field is rough and turf-covered very unlike a good gridiron. The boys appeared in track suits and sweaters, since no football togs were to be had in Oxford.

But the 250 rooters and the shouts of "go get 'em" and "hold 'em" and the familiar line plunges and forward passes made up for the lack of football atmosphere as regarded externals. As usual the English spectators were astounded at the rooting. They were surprised at the referee's cheerful firmness when he remarked casually to some of the players who were grumbling a little, "You lose five yards if you keep on crabbing."

F. W. Layman, Wyoming and Wadham, fullback for the new men, was the star of the game. He made the touchdown in the second quarter, breaking loose around right end for a 40-yard run.

W. C. Frierson, Tennessee and Wadham, quarterback for the new men, showed good generalship, while W. L. Holleman, Oklahoma and Merion, made many gains through the line. L. M. Jiggitts, Mississippi and St. Johns, and C. L. Mock, Ohio and Hartford, did brilliant running and tackling for the old men. They made several successful forward passes.

CONGRESS MUST TAKE ACTION

REEDSPORT, Jan. 7.—The present indications for getting federal aid for the improvement of the river and harbor of the Unipqua does not look very favorable unless congress puts over a new harbor and river bill that they are now working on. This bill authorizes money for new projects of which the Unipqua harbor is listed as a new project.

A river and harbor bill to authorize approximately \$40,000,000 for new projects is likely to be framed after the holiday recess, according to Representative W. C. Hawley, in whose district several projects are awaiting action upon the favorable reports of the army engineers.
