No Chinafying Of Red Russia, Says the Soviet

LONDON, Jan. 10.—Plans for an Anglo-American-Franco-German agreement to penetrate Russia, rebuild her industries, restore her crippled transport system and rehabilitate her generally, will fail unless they are radically revised.

The Russian view is that the "penetrating" countries have planned an attractive wedding, provided a dazzling bridegroom, but have failed even to seek the necessary consent of the bride.

Russia, the United Press learns authoritatively, will not negotiate with a European consortium. If there is any negotiation by Russia, it will be with America at Washington.

Germany in Berlin and France in Paris. There may be first a general meeting. It will have nothing directly to do with penetrating Russia, however, but will deal with recognition of the soviet government.

The position of the Russians is that any sort of capital will be welcomed. Capital is essential to the former empire and Russia cannot be put upon her feet without it.

"But," a soviet trade official said today, "there will be no Chinafying of Russia. Certainly we want capital. And we can make propositions to capitalists that will assure our getting it. But we will get it as a world power should, from individual countries."

"We do not want and are not going to have a combination of world powers exploiting Russia. The soviet government has shown its stability. It has suffered the test of war and famine, and is stronger today than it ever was. It will win through."

"It is not going to be emasculated by granting powers of exploitation to a combination of European financiers. There should be a general meeting of European nations to discuss Russia with Russians. But the meeting would be political, and any discussion of economics would be merely general."

"Russia must be recognized for what it is: a world power—crippled, the capitalists say, by the soviet; we say by the Czarist government which left us to rebuild the ruins when the economic structure of the nation collapsed through the rottenness of its foundations—nevertheless a world power whose vital importance cannot be permanently ignored if there is to be world disarmament. A Pacific agreement, a moratorium of debts, reparation and others, or reconstruction of Europe."

"We need Europe and Europe needs us. Great as is our need, we shudder at the cries of our hungry people, we know we should be fools—traitors to our people and our country—to turn Russian resources and industries over to a trust of European capital. If there is to be capitalistic penetration it will be by agreement of Russia with financiers of individual nations. Some financiers know this. The others will be convinced."

COPPER CARBONATE DUST MAY PROVE SMUT CONTROL.

New Remedy Promising to Check the Disease.

That copper carbonate dust treatment for stinking smut of wheat is apparently successful, is announced by H. P. Baras, plant pathologist of the O. A. C. experiment station.

Although definite results cannot be obtained until next harvest, the winter stand of grain in fields thus treated in 17 Oregon counties shows less injury than stands where seed was treated by either the formaldehyde or the bluestone-blue method.

"It is entirely possible that this method may in time supersede the cumbersome liquid treatment," said Professor Baras. "It also seems to promote prompt and more vigorous germination. Two ounces of copper carbonate in dust form are thoroughly mixed with each bushel of seed in a revolving drum."

"The ultimate solution of the smut problem does not lie in improved treating methods, but in the growing of varieties of wheat which are highly resistant or immune to the disease. Great progress has been made in Oregon under the direction of H. M. Woolman, field assistant in cereal investigations. In trials with nearly 1000 varieties and strains of

TIMBER CUT 4 TIMES AS FAST AS IT GROWS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Timber in the United States is being consumed four times as rapidly as it is being grown. W. B. Greeley, chief of the forest service, told the house agricultural committee today in urging federal legislation designed to conserve the country's forests.

The United States, according to the chief forester, faces the definite prospect of a growing scarcity and increased cost of everything made of wood. Mr. Greeley emphasized that 21 per cent of the timber left in the

United States is west of the Rocky mountains, at some distance, he said, from markets and the bulk of the country's population.

George S. Long of Tacoma, Wash., representing the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, declared that the industry as a whole favored the legislation. Some lumber manufacturers, he said, had objected to it, however, on the ground that it would result in government interference in private initiative.
