Fish and Game Commission Reports

SALEM, Jan. 12.—The experience of the past year has conclusively demonstrated the wisdom in the complete segregation of the commercial fishing and game interests of Oregon, according to A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden, in his annual report filed with Secretary of State Koser today.

The report points out that more progress in game protection and propaganda has been brought about in the past year than during any similar period and that the affairs of the game commission are conducted in a more businesslike manner and with more expediency and the funds of the department expended more judiciously by reason of the game commission giving primary consideration to game affairs.

The report shows receipts for the year aggregating \$274,903.60 with disbursements aggregating \$219,547.31 or a balance to the credit of the department for the year in excess of \$55,356.29.

During the year there were 655 arrests for violations of state fish and game laws with 509 convictions and fines imposed aggregating \$18,780 of which amount \$850 was suspended. The fines are divided between the counties in which the arrest is made and the game commission.

A total of 2694 game birds were liberated during the year, according to the report which shows 3250 birds on hand at the game farms at Corvallis and Eugene.

Trout fry liberated during the year aggregated 9,784,664. Of this number 2,583,258, mostly rainbow trout, were liberated in Klamath county alone.

Finds Key to Gold Hidden 150 Years

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Jan. 12.—(United Press.)—The key to \$2,500,000 worth of Spanish gold, hidden in a cache in the wilds of the Ozark mountains in Arkansas more than 150 years ago by a party of settlers to keep it from falling into the hands of Indians, was reported found today.

Anthony Penninger, who is forming a company in Denver to search for the hidden treasure said 22 years ago the Spanish government conducted an extended hunt for it, but the search, like others privately made since that time, eventually was dropped.

That he had discovered the key to the chartered cache was the assertion of Penninger. He and a group of prominent Denver business men plan to search for the gold early in the spring.

"I knew nothing of the buried treasure until I went to Eden's Bluff in the White River country on a squirrel hunt last fall," Penninger declared. "Across the river from the bluff I stumbled over a stone covered with hieroglyphics. I scraped the dirt and moss from the inscription and called the attention of the find to a native. This native told me an extended search for the treasure had been made by the Spanish government 22 years ago."

The settlers were killed by the Indians after the treasure had been hidden, according to Penninger. A party of native Arkansas is supposed to have unearthed the tunnel to the cache 10 years ago, but abandoned the search after one of the members was killed by a landslide.

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FAMOUS UNCLES IN FICTION

Up to About Thirty Years Ago Mrs. Stowe's Hero Might Be Said to Be Favorite.

Who is the most famous uncle in literature? Thirty years ago only one answer could have been given. It would have been "Uncle Tom," who dwelt in the world-renowned "cabin," and whose sufferings did much to hasten the emancipation of his fellow slaves, London Answers states. He was only an "uncle" by courtesy, just as many an old woman is addressed as "granny" who has no other claim to that title except age.

Almost as well known today is another "uncle by courtesy," also a negro. This is the immortal "Uncle Remus," whom Joel Chandler Harris depicts so infinitely as relating to a little white boy the fanciful doings of Brer Rabbit, Brer Fox, Brer Tarapin and Brer Bear. Uncle Remus is a universal favorite, and all the children are his nephews and nieces.

Probably the most humorous uncle in literature is that Uncle Podger who hangs a picture in J. K. Jerome's "Three Men in a Boat," whilst undoubtedly the most saturnine is Uncle Ralph Nickleby, in Dickens' masterpiece, and the most horrible that frightful old miser uncle of David Balfour, in Robert Louis Stevenson's "Kidnapped."

The creator of Sherlock Holmes has a very attractive uncle in the best of his French novels, "Uncle Bernac," and those who are above military age will recall the long-suffering "Uncle Harry," who endured a week's misery with "Budge and Toddy," in that once world-read book, "Helen's Babies."

HERE'S A BUDDING NOVELIST

Indiana Youngster May Yet Add to Long List of State's Successful Authors.

Ellis Hunter has a seven-year-old son, Lyman. Several days ago Lyman's teacher announced that all the pupils in the room were to write an original story. Mr. and Mrs. Hunter observed their young son lying on the floor pondering heavily on his contribution to Indiana's well-known stock of made-in-Indiana literature.

When, at last, the job was done, the proud parents discovered that their youthful author had written a stirring narrative called "Jim and John." And here was Lyman's story:

"One bright summer day Jim and John were playing in the dark. They heard a noise in the house. So they went in. They were all alone. They saw a burglar. They tip toed up stairs together for there gun. When they got up there they saw another burglar. So they tip toed around the other way and got a gun. Then they went down stairs and shot that burglar. Then they went up stairs and shot the other burglar and got all the things that had stolen. When their mother came home the boys told the whole story and they lived happy ever after."—Kansas City Star.

Weigh Elements of Universe.

Atomic weights of nearly forty of the ninety chemical elements from which the universe is built have been determined by Prof. Theodore Richards and Prof. Gregory E. Baxter, according to announcement by Harvard university.

The figures were issued after 35 years of experimentation, and some of the data is being used by thousands of chemists throughout the world, the report says.

Among the facts discovered was that iron and nickel from meteorites have the same atomic weights as iron and nickel from the earth, indicating the unity of the universe. It was also found that silver and copper, wherever dug, are of constant weight, but that there are two weights of lead, that from radium materials being lighter than the ordinary kind.

Keeping Car's Temperature.

It is desirable during the transit of fruit in a refrigerator car to know the precise temperature in different parts of the car, for this temperature is seldom the same throughout the interior of the car. For this purpose the Department of Agriculture has now in use an instrument which is described in Popular Mechanics Magazine. It has twelve resistance thermometers for recording the temperature at twelve different parts of the car. The instruments are connected by a cable to a twelve-point plug that fits a socket on the recording box, so that a circuit can be established with any of the twelve thermometers. The exact temperature is shown on a register in one corner of the box and a chart shows the location of each thermometer.

"Moll Cutpurse," Notorious Thief. Mary Frith, sometimes called "Moll Cutpurse," a notorious thief in the time of Charles I (1625-1649), died of dropsy at the age of seventy-four. She possessed great physical strength, and frequently assumed man's attire. Having on one occasion held up Lord Fairfax on Hounslow heath, she was captured and sent to Newgate, but escaped by means of bribery.

Titled Women in "Movies." Among the women of the English aristocracy who have become motion picture actresses are Lady Diana Cooper, daughter of the duke of Rutland; the Hon. Lois Stuart, daughter of Lady Alington; Miss Peggy Woodham, daughter of Lord Inchcape, and Lady Helen.

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BEFORE MATCHES WERE MADE

Primitive Peoples Had Ingenious Means of Making Fires That Answered the Same Purpose.

Two methods of making fire were in use among the aborigines of North America at the time of the discovery. The first method consisted of striking a spark from flint and pyrites—a hard ore containing usually considerable iron. This method was practiced by the Eskimos and by the Athapascans and Algonquins tribes ranging across the continent from the Pacific coast to Newfoundland and down the Atlantic coast.

The most valued and most effectual method of making fire known to the Indians was that of the reciprocating motion of wood on wood and igniting the ground off particles through heat generated by friction. The simplest method was to whirl rapidly backward and forward a wooden rod or drill. The drill turned in a lower piece of wood which may be called the hearth. The drill was worked near the border of the hearth, cutting a socket. From the socket a narrow canal was cut in the edge of the hearth, the function of the canal being to collect the powdered wood ground off by the friction of the drill, as within this wood meal the lent rose to the ignition point.

The Pause of Emphasis.

The historic old church of St. Michael's, in Charleston, S. C.—to be a member of which is the open sesame to Charleston society—had at one time a very eccentric pastor, whose congregation never knew just what he would do next. One hot July afternoon he entered his pulpit, with the sounding board above, sat down and wiped the perspiration from his face, remarking, in a calm, unruffled tone: "D—d hot day."

"Of course the congregation was thunderstruck. With all his peculiarities, they had not dreamed of anything like this. So still was the audience that the drop of a pin could have been heard. After a long time, when the perspiration had been carefully wiped from cheek and brow, he concluded:

"That's what I heard an irreverent young man say as I came in."—Harper's Magazine.

Had to Be Masters of Craft.

Carved and hand-made chests, sideboards, tables, chairs and other antiques are rightly valued by people of discriminating taste. In the fifteenth century men were known to have worked eight years or more carving a single one of these intricate pieces, fitting the drawers perfectly and balancing everything. Certainly any piece of furniture on which those masters of the cabinetmaker's art spent so much time and thought are worthy of appreciation.

An apprentice to the art of cabinetmaking commonly worked from three to eight years making his first piece of furniture. This work then was passed upon by jurors, and if the verdict was "imperfect," it was burned before the door of the maker and he was forbidden to make furniture for sale until he had relearned himself with an acceptable piece.
