At the conclusion he said the provisional government will now assume the power to carry out the treaty terms. The Dail will remain in existence until the treaty terms are carried out after which will be a general election.

SEATTLE AFTER WOOL BUSINESS

YAKIMA, Jan. 14.—A delegation of Seattle business men are today in conference with wool growers here. They pledge \$2,500,000 loans on warehouse receipts and offer dockage storage and space for wool and mutton. The growers' committee will go to Seattle to investigate. The growers now shipping to Portland oppose the proposition.

RISQUE MAGAZINES WILL BE BANNED

DENVER, Jan. 14.—Through the efforts of the Women's Cooperative League the city officials will try to suppress the sale of risque magazines. The publishers retained counsel and will carry the fight to the supreme court.

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—Josefa and Rosa Blazek, "Siamese twins," must remain jointed together until their death, physicians decided after an X-Ray examination today.

The twins, born attached to each other contemplated an operation to separate themselves, but feared that the death of one might cause the death of the other. The doctors declared that to separate them now would result in the death of both, and expressed the opinion that if one should die, the other might also die unless a physician could immediately sever them. They are 44 years old.
