Andy Smith's  
Tactical Failure

BERKLEY, Cal., Jan. 16. (United Press.)—Andy Smith's first tactical failure. That is the manner in which a well-motivated and less inclined to be a student body generally regards the debate at Pasadena when California's "wonder team" was set down up the "set-up"—morally, at least, although the score was a tie. In retrospect, the general opinion is that Andy was relying too much

on a figurative twelfth man on his team—the weather man.

That the Bears had no muddy-field plays, and had been staking everything on a fast field and a number of spectacular plays, was obvious. Just how Andy Smith, who usually takes nothing for granted, slipped up in this particular is puzzling the students, who have lost a great deal of that "We own the earth" air since January 2.

It is generally thought that Andy had over-rated the defensive power of the Bears, and the line-backing power, under any and all conditions. A good man, old California grade are secretly rather pleased at the result, as they believe it will mean better teams in the future.

"There was getting to be too much of an air on the campus that California could clean up any other team merely because it was California, and that this condition would automatically last forever," said one old grad well known in sport circles.

"When this idea gets abroad—the sooner a fall comes, the better. It was particularly good in this case because it at least left California out without a technical defeat to mar two years' splendid work."

"But the 'set-down' at Pasadena will make next year's Bear team realize that they have to fight every inch of the way, and not live on reputation. And it has also added to Andy Smith's stock of wisdom."

"California was getting cocky, and the fact that it was in bad with the public in general was shown by the openly expressed pleasure after the game from almost every quarter that California had a come down. It will be a good thing in the long run. It will be particularly good for next year, when we will have to fight hard to win over both Stanford and U. S. C., both of which schools have strong teams in sight. In two years we have to put everything we have into the game to win over Stanford, and we may do it even then."

"When the California-Stanford game returns to that stage, football will again be 'back to normalcy' on the coast."

Treasures of gold and jewels are still hidden in Russia, secure from soviet requisitions and robberies, their estimated value amounting to the hundreds of millions of gold rubles. Russian families, especially in jewel collections, were far more wealthy than families of corresponding means in other countries, and it is certain that neither the soviet nor refugees have taken all these gems for sale abroad. On several occasions, families have told the correspondent how they outwitted the soviet agents. In one family, diamond and pearl necklaces were broken up and the parts hidden, at dead of night, in bed posts. In the tubing of electric light conduits, in garbage pails and even in paperweights lying exposed on a table. When soviet agents came to make inspections they tapped the walls, tore up the floors and dug in the gardens, but found nothing. With free trade, many of these hidden treasures are coming out, to be sold in the market, to tide the owners through the winter.

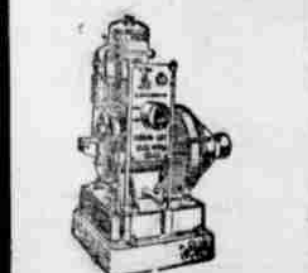
