ANNUAL MEETING OF FARM BUREAU

Will be Held at Court House
On Monday January 23.

SEVERAL FINE SPEAKERS

George A. Mansfield, President of the State Organization, Will Attend to Address Meeting—C. J. Hard Will Be Here.

The annual meeting of the Douglas County Farm Bureau will be held on Monday, January 23, at the Douglas county courthouse in Roseburg. This meeting has been put off from time to time in order that Mr. George A. Mansfield, president of the State Farm Bureau, might be here. We have just received word from Mr. Mansfield that he and Colonel Wm. Aird, who is secretary-treasurer of the State Farm Bureau, will both be here on that date.

In addition to these representatives of the state federation, we have secured for the day Mr. R. A. Ward, manager of the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers association, who will take up in detail the work of this co-operative marketing organization with the farmers. Many sales have been reported by this organization at prices much in advance of other quotations, owing to the proper grading and handling of the product.

Mr. Albert G. Allen, state horticultural commissioner for this district, will be present and will speak on the horticultural laws of Oregon. His work will be of especial interest to the fruit men, as this point in the game is not well understood throughout the county. Much can be done to protect the fruit grower that has not been done in the past.

A representative of the Pacific Poultry Producers association from Portland will be here in the interests of the poultrymen. This association is securing for its members the best prices obtainable for their product. Here again comes in the correct methods of handling and marketing.

Mr. C. J. Hard, assistant state leader of county agents, will also be present and take part in the meeting. It is expected that at this time some action will be taken toward selecting the county agent for Douglas county for the coming year.

The executive committee of the Douglas County Farm Bureau will give a report of the work in the county for the year and suggest plans that may be of assistance to the new executive committee and officers that will be chosen at this meeting.

Mr. Ransing, manager of the Douglas County Farm Bureau Co-operative Exchange, will give a report of the work of the Exchange. This organization has proven very satisfactory to its patrons and is growing every day.

Forest Rangers to Meet Here Soon

A joint meeting of the forest rangers of the Umpqua, Siskiyou and Crater forests will be held in Roseburg on February 11 and 12 at the local forest service office. These joint meetings are held once every two years and this is the first time Roseburg has been chosen as the meeting place. The meeting is called primarily for the study of plans and data procured to date on the work of range appraisal and to consider matters relating to fire prevention and suppression. About 25 rangers representing the three forests will be present, together with a number of the district officers from Portland and other places throughout the state.
