

Region to Take Census of All Ex-Service Men

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 17.—The most important meeting of the American Legion ever held between national conventions will be called in this city, January 20 and 21, to arrange for a census of every ex-serviceman and a woman in the country. The plan that national commander MacNider will present to the convention calls for personal interviews by Legion canvassers of all ex-servicemen.

R. Forbes, director of the United States Veterans' Bureau will come to the personal representative of the American Legion and Federal Judge J. M. Landis, of Chicago, will be one of the speakers. All state commanders, adjutants and national executive committee members, chairmen of local committees and national officers will be present. Representatives of the War and Navy departments will also attend. The national executive committee of the American Legion Auxiliary, an organization of women relatives of Legion members, will meet concurrently.

The census will be known as a "census of compensation campaign" and is modeled after the "Iowa census" successfully used in that state. Mr. MacNider was commander of the Iowa Legion. After approval by the convention, the census will be undertaken in all states. The country will be divided into districts, with a Legion committee to supervise. Districts will be small enough so that thorough canvassing can be assured. Legion members will work under the committee and will visit every home and interview every veteran.

Questionnaires will be used to ascertain, first, what form of adjusted compensation is preferred of the five offered in paid-up insurance, vocational training, aid in buying a home, and aid in settling land. Mr. MacNider has a plan whereby veterans will be given the option of turning their compensation payment into a fund, to be administered by the Legion and out of which loans will be made to disabled, unemployed or needy comrades. He believes this fund will total several million dollars. Canvassers in the census will ascertain how many veterans will turn money to this fund. The subject of unemployment also will be considered at the convention. Some means devised whereby the Legion can assist nationally in placing ex-servicemen in jobs. A committee will bring in a report on the memorial proposed in honor of the late P. W. Galbraith, who was killed while serving as Legion national commander.

HAVE NOT "TAMED" LIGHTNING

Expression Is Common Since Franklin's Famous Experiment, but It Is Not Accurate.

When we wish to speak figuratively of our achievements in electricity we are accustomed to boast that we have "tamed the lightning," or something of the kind. But in reality we have done no such thing. Lightning is a well-known natural electrical phenomenon; but the electricity that we use is drawn from another source—it was "tamed" to start with. To catch a lightning discharge and reduce its voltage so that it may be utilized is a different matter. It may be suggested that the result might not be worth the trouble.

Ever since Franklin's famous kite was sent upon its flight certain optimistic individuals have thought that this pretty experiment was the key to untold power and wealth. The tumult caused by a severe thunder storm has evidently led them to believe that vast quantities of electricity are tumbling about in the upper air, and to render these available to man needs only some method of tapping the invisible reservoir. Now it has been said that the quantity of electricity taking part in a flash of lightning could be collected on a thimble; but the handling and restraining of this thimbleful of electricity present a problem which few electrical engineers would care to undertake. It is a great achievement to use the water at Niagara to drive a dynamo; but most of us would hesitate at the thought of employing a stream of rifle bullets for the same purpose.

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"Airline" Route to Be Established

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17. (United Press.)—An "airline" route between practically all the great cities of the west will soon be established, according to the Aircraft Transportation company of this city.

The company plans to install lines of commercial and passenger airplanes, to be in operation by July 1, 1922, flying on a 2 1/2 hour schedule between San Francisco and Los Angeles, 4 hours between San Francisco and Tonopah, Nev., and 2 1/2 hours by seaplane to Eureka.

The airplanes which will be used on the trips are now nearing completion in New York, according to David G. Re Vley, general manager of the concern.

Each plane, he states, will have a capacity of 30 persons, 750 pounds of personal baggage, and 100 pounds of express. The crew will consist of two men. The passenger coach will be completely enclosed and furnished with the latest conveniences.

The planes are of American make, of the Remington-Burnell type, all-metal, and equipped with two 600 horse-power motors capable of a speed in excess of 125 miles an hour.

The San Francisco terminal of the line will be at San Mateo, with fast bus connections to carry passengers to the city.

The DeMille field at Los Angeles will be used by the company, and if traffic warrants it, regular stops will be made at Bakersfield and Fresno.
