Cold Weather Grips Northwest

Bitter cold, clear weather held the northwest in a silent grip today. Many western Oregon and Washington points reported temperatures ranging from 15 to 18 degrees above this morning. Eastern Oregon and Washington cities are suffering more severe weather, with the mercury hovering below zero this morning. Spokane reported 13 below at 7:30 this morning, the coldest since 1905. In Roseburg the reading at 5 o'clock this morning gave a temperature of 22 degrees. This dropped to 18 degrees at 8 o'clock. The center of high pressure is directly over this section of the coast, the weather bureau reports, and colder weather is expected tonight. Other cities reporting low temperatures were: Portland, 20; Seattle, 20; Walla Walla, 2 below; Baker, 2; Yakima, 0; Marshfield, 24; Red Bluff, 24; Sacramento, 26.

Coast Road to Be Improved

PORTLAND, Jan. 18.—In accordance with the new federal aid law, the highway commission yesterday submitted a tentative map showing the primary and secondary road systems of the state. The primary roads indicated are the Pacific highway, The Dallas-California highway and the Columbia river highway with its Old Oregon Trail extension. In the secondary road system are the Roosevelt highway, John Day highway, Grants Pass-Crescent City road, Ashland-Klamath Falls road, McKenzie highway, Oregon-Washington highway, Roseburg-Coos Bay highway, West Side highway and Crater Lake road.

Under the law the primary roads must be interstate in character and whether they come within this meaning must be determined by the secretary of agriculture. Secondary roads must be inter-county in character. On the primary system are 1174 miles and on the secondary system 1539 miles.

The commissioners ordered advertised for February letting the paving of Pacific highway between Albany and Tangent and the grading of the Camas valley section of the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway. District Forester Cecil was asked if the forest department would put in \$150,000 on the Trail-Prospect section of the Crater Lake road, the state cooperating with a like amount. The money to be used for grading and bridges. Mr. Cecil replied that it might be arranged if the state would stipulate in the contract not to ask further aid from the forest department for surfacing the road. The matter was tentatively settled with the understanding that the phenology of the stipulation would be such that some time in the future the forest people could still cooperate if funds are available and the department sees fit.

Circus Robbers Are Found Guilty

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 18.—Bert Orcutt and Roy Moore, of Seattle, were convicted by a jury today after an all night's deliberation, of robbing the Sells-Floto circus on September 16, 1921. The trial lasted eight days.
