Is a very simple matter to increase the size of the storage tank. Mr. Catching even having used a 50 gallon barrel in his demonstrations, the air being exhausted by the motor in less than 30 seconds. By increasing the size of the diaphragm a pull as strong as desired may be secured.

Should it be desired to operate a system of trailers using this brake, fifteen or twenty of the size on exhibit could be operated from the motor of the touring car. The model of the invention exhibited by Mr. Catching exerts a pull of between 500 and 1,000 pounds. It is independent of both the foot brake and the emergency and both can be used together or separately, the vacuum brake operating as a third brake.

Local mechanics and dealers are very enthusiastic over the invention and pronounce it one of the most practical to be brought out for the automobile industry for many years. A great future is predicted for it.

Case In Justice Court Decided

The case of W. H. Fisher vs. D. M. Barton tried recently in the justice court, was decided today by Justice Jones in favor of the plaintiff. The case was one in which Mrs. Barton, wife of the defendant, purchased goods at the Fisher store and charged them to her husband. Barton refused to pay claiming that he and his wife had separated three days before and that he had given her a sum of money and a ticket to Los Angeles. Decision in favor of the plaintiff was made on the grounds that there had been no legal separation and that consequently Barton was responsible as he had given no notice that he would not pay the bills contracted by her.

Primitive Conditions of Life.
The natives of some unexplored regions of South America make little clearings, usually one or two, but sometimes as many as 20 or 30 acres. These gardens are disorderly affairs, with the half-burnt stumps left sticking up. They plant them without apparent method. They generally have a great deal of corn, our potatoes, which is their form of cereal. It also furnishes the native drink, in fermented form.

As to meat, they eat only what they can catch and kill, with meat, exclusively, and they hunt largely with bow and arrow. It is no rare sight to see an Indian starting off with a great bow six feet long to shoot birds, for which he uses a blunt arrow, says Professor Henshaw. They use barbed arrows to shoot fish.
