DRUGGISTS TO MEET HERE IN JUNE

Convention Will Be Held In This City Decided at Meeting Held Yesterday.

PLANS ARE STARTED

Fishing in North Umpqua River Will Be One of the Chief Sports by Which Visitors Will Be Entertained.

The retail druggists of the state of Oregon have chosen Roseburg for their 1922 convention. At a meeting of the local druggists called in session by Frank S. Ward, secretary of the Oregon State Board of Pharmacy, June 5, 6, and 7, was tentatively selected the date for the annual druggist convention.

Seaside secured the convention last year and Roseburg will have to gather all the pep and energy that she can to equal the program featured by Seaside. The many attractions of this famous resort brought a large gathering, and yet with other cities bidding for the 1922 convention Roseburg was again successful against many competitors. The Oregon State Pharmaceutical association represents the retail druggists of the state with Claud Ken of Cottage Grove as the president. They hold a three days' session, including the election of officers for the next year, and papers dealing with all matters effecting their association, wholesaling and retailing, and general merchandising are read and openly discussed at these business meetings.

At this time of the year strawberries and cherries will be plentiful, and these products of the Umpqua valley are going to be featured in the publicity gotten out by this association. There are a large number of expert fishermen who are anxious to meet here on account of the unexcelled fishing offered in the many streams of this vicinity, for there is no river in the state where salmon as large as those caught in the Umpqua river can be taken by a fairly good fisherman.

The majority of these delegates are driving their own cars as the highway from California to Portland will be in first class condition by June. It may be necessary to call on the local residents to list their rooms for these various conventions, as it is doubtful if the hotels can take care of this many together, with the large tourist trade which will be here at that time. They will no doubt make their headquarters at the Hotel Umpqua, and arrangements may be made for holding their meeting in the large private dining room.

Mayor Hamilton, Dr. Seely, Dr. Houck, Dr. E. B. Stewart and Hon. B. L. Eddy are being interviewed by Mr. Ward regarding some of the details of the convention.

All of the traveling men of the various wholesale, jobbing and drug houses are spreading the convention information regarding the wonders of the Umpqua valley and the accommodations that can be had at Roseburg, and it is expected that this convention will draw a larger number of accredited delegates than assembled at Seaside.

The Umpqua valley is coming into her own, and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is actively assisting in these big conventions and has been the driving and drawing force in bringing them to this city.

Claim Pope Is Alive.
(By United Press.)

(1:26). ROME, Jan. 21.—An official bulletin issued by physicians at 5:30 this evening said: "Pope Benedict is now in a comatose condition. He grew worse during the day. His heart is growing weaker and he is breathing with the greatest difficulty."

Illness Was Short.
ROME, Jan. 21.—The Pope's illness lasted only a few days, and only early this week was his condition

BRIEF SUMMARY OF POPE'S LIFE

- Born at Pegli in the diocese of Genoa, Italy, Nov. 21, 1854.
- Ordained to priesthood in Homeland in 1878.
- Became secretary to Monsignor Rampolla, afterwards Cardinal Rampolla, when that prelate was papal nuncio to Madrid, Spain, in 1883.
- Returned to Rome with Cardinal Rampolla and entered the secretariat of state, one of the "minutans" in 1887.
- Appointed substitute of the secretariat and secretary of the eucharist in 1901 under Cardinal Merry Del Val.
- Appointed Archbishop of Bologna Dec. 18, 1917, by Pope Pius X., and on Dec. 25, 1907, consecrated in the Sistine chapel by the pontiff.
- Created a cardinal by Pope Pius X. at last consistory of pontiff's life, May 25, 1914.
- Elected Pope of the Roman Catholic church Sept. 2, 1914.
- Took name of Pope Benedict XV. and gave his first apostolic blessing Sept. 3, 1914.

considered sufficiently serious for the public to be informed. Thursday of last week while celebrating mass he complained of chills, and was seized with a spell of coughing. He attended his papal duties until Wednesday of this week.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Cardinal Gasparri is prominently mentioned as successor to the Pope. Cardinal Delal and Cardinal Merry Del Val are also considered among the possibilities.

Was Pious in Body.

Pope Benedict XV. was born in Pegli, in the diocese of Genoa, Italy, November 21, 1854.

Gioacchino Della Chiesa, as Pope Benedict XV. was christened, spent all his boyhood in the little Italian town. He was born an aristocrat, scion of a democratic aristocracy, the ancient Ligurian nobility, members of which are prominent in the learned professions in Italy.

His father was the Marchese Giuseppe Della Chiesa and his mother the Marchesa Giovanna Migliorini. Both are dead. His elder brother, the admiral, inherited the title. The Pope was a puny, delicate baby and grave doubt was expressed when he was born that he would live many hours. He was educated in Capranica college in Rome and four years later he was ordained a priest.


He at once entered the Academic for Noble Ecclesiastical, from which the then Monsignor Rampolla took him to be his private secretary in 1883. Rampolla was made papal nuncio at Madrid, a post of the greatest importance at that time. The young priest won the affection of Rampolla who gave him a training in diplomacy such as could probably have gained from no other living man. When Rampolla returned to Rome as secretary of state to Leo XIII., he took Monsignor Della Chiesa with him and made him under-secretary. Following the death of Leo XIII., Cardinal Merry del Val took the place of Rampolla as secretary of state. Monsignor Della Chiesa remained, however, at his post. He was made cardinal May 25, 1914.

When Cardinal Della Chiesa went into the conclave after the death of Pope Pius X. there were few who believed his election was a possibility.

TRAIN SCHEDULE TO BE CHANGED
It was announced today that the time schedule of two of the Southern Pacific trains running through Roseburg will be changed taking effect February 12.

The "Shasta," running between San Francisco and Portland, will make the trip each way an hour faster, thus giving 2 1/2 hour service between the two cities.

The San Francisco and Portland express, train No. 14, will leave San Francisco at 9:20 a. m. instead of 9:20 p. m., arriving at Portland at 8:20 p. m. instead of 9:20 p. m., thus rendering a much more satisfactory service from San Francisco to Sacramento and the Sacramento valley, and also giving a much more attractive service in Oregon.

The complete schedule will be announced in a short time.

EXPECTS A REPORT SOON ON COOS BAY AND UMPQUA
WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 20.—Favorable reports are expected soon from the Coos Bay and Harbors committee. Representative Hawley said today, on the proposed improvements at Coos Bay and the port of Umpqua. The board of army engineers reported favorably on the Coos Bay project, which calls for the construction of two jetties and other improvements at a cost of \$2,250,000 only a few days ago.

The Umpqua project, which involves the construction of one jetty at a cost of \$287,000, was recommended by the board before the war.
