Tax Commission

Discuss Valuation

PORTLAND, Jan. 25.—The discussion of valuations placed by the county boards of equalization occupied the state tax commission this morning. I. N. Day, chairman, presented figures showing that valuations of taxable land ranged from \$9.42 per acre in Curry county to \$162.57 in Multnomah county. Six counties listed the taxable and non-taxable together. A wide range of valuations on timber lands and livestock were also shown. Pierce, of La Grande, acted as chairman, and stated the commission has come to believe that all necessary state revenues cannot be derived from the income tax.

HERDS HEADED BY PUREBREDS

Cow Testing Associations in West Reach Mark of 100 Per Cent—Disgrace to Use Scrub.

One—two—three! One cow-testing association in Washington, two in Colorado, and three in Idaho have reached the mark of 100 per cent of their herds headed by purebred bulls. This was the count in the spring of 1921 in the territory of the western office of the dairy division of the United States Department of Agriculture. In the fall of this year one-third of the associations in the western states were 100 per cent in their use of purebred bulls. In some localities it is coming to be considered a disgrace for anyone to use a scrub bull.

AVOID DISAGREEABLE SMELLS

Unless Scrupulous Care Is Taken Unpleasant Odors Are Likely to Hurt Products.

In winter smells are apt to find their way to milk and butter quite as readily as in summer. Now these products must be kept in the house, and some artificial heat must be used to keep them from freezing. This close confinement is very apt to bring an unpleasant smell or taste to milk and butter unless the most scrupulous care is taken. Milk ought never to be kept anywhere near the kitchen. If it is, some bad smells will surely be imparted to the milk and cream.

The year 1922 is to see a boom in pigeon racing, we are told; a form of sport that is quite modern, although the use of the pigeon as a messenger is at least as old as Solomon. It was a little over a century ago that long-distance flying began with a race of a hundred miles in Belgium. This was soon followed by a race from London to Belgium, but even then it was not until 1881 that regular races were begun in England. In the early days the birds averaged about 1,250 yards a minute, but training has raised their speed now to something over 60 miles an hour.

Three Crops of Corn in Year.

On account of excessive rains oats cannot be grown in the Philippine Islands; rust affects it. Corn grows well; Filipino farmers can harvest three crops a year from a single piece of ground. To keep it, it is necessary to leave it in the husk, otherwise weevils destroy it. It is tied in bundles and hung on bamboo poles and husked and shelled as needed. Corn mills are now being established in the Visayan Islands, where the natives prefer cornmeal to rice as a staple food.
