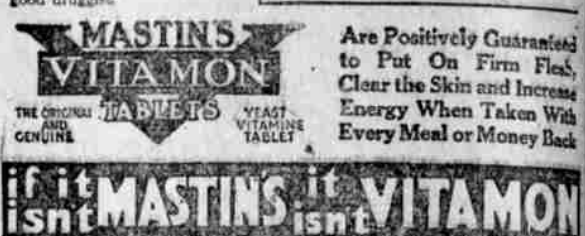

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Stages, Jitneys, Trucks

The last State Legislature passed an act by which all stages, jitneys and trucks operating on the public highways in the state of Oregon must furnish a Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance Policy and a Good Faith bond which must be filed with the Public Service Commission at Salem.

Trucks must carry the same insurance as well as insurance on the goods which is being transported by them.
