### FIRST CUPBOARD IN AMERICA

Said to Have Been Brought to the Country by Lord Fairfax—Preceded Cellarette.

It was not the custom until a recent period for each person to have a separate drinking vessel, and even as late as 1856 one writer says: "As for drink, it is usually filled in pots, goblets, jugs, bowls of silver in noblemen's houses; also in fine Venetian glasses of all forms, and for want of these elsewhere pots of earth are used. All of which are seldom set upon the table, but each one, as necessity urges, calleth for a cup of such drinks as he likes."

A "cupboard richly garnished" was therefore a necessity in those days. That was one of the ways people displayed their wealth.

Lord Fairfax is said to have brought the first cupboard to this country when he settled in Virginia.

The framework of the first "cupboards" was always covered with "cupboard carpet" and for this purpose rugs of "Turkeywork" were imported from the East and became the first burlings of those larger coverings to which nowadays along the word carpet is attached. The change from an open stage to a closed "cupboard," in the modern sense, was a gradual one, and arose out of the pilfering tendencies of the servants of those days. "Almarras" or "claviers," were, therefore, placed in the lower part of the stage, into which the food was placed. The cupboard then became a "larder," and is frequently mentioned by old authors. After came the cellarette.

### Baseball and Football Are First Cousins

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Three of the greatest football teams in the country were turned out last season by prominent figures in the baseball world.

Penn State—coached by Hugo Bezdek, former manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Centre—coached by Charley Moran, National League umpire.

Washington and Jefferson—coached by Earl "Greasy" Neale, outfielder for the Cincinnati Reds.

Because these three eleven were so prominent in the spotlight, attention was drawn to the rather close association between baseball and football strategy.

However, this has been evident, if not so apparent, for years. Major league baseball has for a long time borne a strong inter-collegiate football complexion.

Jim Thorpe, regarded as the greatest all-around football star ever developed, made good in baseball. He is still in the game and hit over .300 last season in the American Association.

Frank Frisch, star infielder of the New York Giants was a brilliant half-back during his college days at Fordham when the same speed that made him a diamond on the field, made him one of the most elusive backs in the east.

Howard Berry, one of the greatest backs, developed at Pennsylvania and a star all-around athlete on the track and field, is now a utility outfielder with the Giants.

The New York Yanks have under promise Killinger, the All-American back of the 1921 Penn State team and a third baseman, whom Hugo Bezdek brands a sure sensation in the major leagues.

The American League champs also have another football product of Bezdek's 1920 eleven, Hinkley Haines, an outfielder.

Eddie Collins, star second baseman and captain of the White Sox, was a great quarterback at Columbia.

Rip Collins, pitcher for the Boston Red Sox, was a star with the Texas Aggies before the war. Del Pratt, second baseman of the same club, was an All-Southern back while playing with Alabama, a university which also developed two other stars, Leo Sewell and Riggs Stephenson, who made good with the Cleveland Indians.

"Greasy" Neale earned his nickname because of his great open field running while playing with West Virginia Wesleyan. He had developed into one of the best coaches in the game as proved when his team won a moral victory over California in a no-score tie game. Neale coaches in the game as Bezdek did.

Jake Stahl, who managed the Boston Red Sox some years back was a great half-back at Illinois and Fred Merkle, former star first baseman for the New York Giants, also won a football letter at Illinois.

Jack Coombs played at Colby and Harry Lord was a star at Bates. Christ Mathewson and "Moore" McCormick starred at Bucknell. Ray Fisher, former Cincinnati pitcher, made his name at Middlebury and Dave Fultz was an All-American back at Brown.

Hugo Bezdek never played major league baseball, but he managed the Pirates. He learned his football at Chicago where he was a star tackle.

Charley Moran is not the only umpire actively connected with "big time" football, as Ernie Quigley is one of the most competent referees in the west.

### Catchers Are Favorites For Bossing Jobs

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Yousters who want to stay in the game after their baseball legs give out should go to catching.

It seems from figures that the wise old backstops have the best chance of remaining in the game at big money after their field days are over.

One-half of the major league managers are old catchers and practically every one of them have teams up in the races in both leagues. Old time catchers in fact have become so successful in handling teams that club owners are seeking them for open berths.

The National League leads with six managers who have served behind the bat. Pat Moran, manager of the Reds, has two pennants and a world's championship to his credit. Branch Rickey has the runner-up last year and the prospective dark horse of 1922.

George Gibson failed to win a pennant in his first year out when his team collapsed in the stretch with the pennant almost clinched.

Fred Mitchell made a success of the Braves and put the National League on the map in Boston. Bill Killefer, star catcher of the Cubs, is the only playing manager among the receivers.

He started in mid-season last year after Johnny Evers resigned and he did as well with the club as could be expected.

Uncle Wilbert Robinson is another good example of the success achieved by former catchers. Brooklyn swears by him and he is one of the most popular and most able managers in the game.

Only two managers in the American League can trace their career back to the mask and big glove days. Connie Mack, veteran manager of the Athletics, is the dean of them all.

The lean leader of the Philadelphia Americans used to be the king of them all, but he has been in the slumps for six years. Lee Fohl, who has built up a pennant contender for the St. Louis Browns is the only other former catcher handling a club in Ban Johnson's circuit.

### HOW ISLANDS WERE PEOPLED

Anthropologists Believe It Was as a Result of Involuntary Voyages Made by Savages.

Sixteen natives of the Pelew Islands in the north Pacific made an involuntary canoe voyage to Formosa, which anthropologists find interesting.

As reported, the voyage seems to add proof to a current theory of the manner in which the innumerable islands of Oceania were settled by man.

Now, the Pelew Islands lie east of the southern groups of the Philippines. Sixteen savages in three canoes with outriggers were fishing near one of the islands when a gale blew up and carried them out to sea. They had nothing to eat but fish. They were driven out for many days, some say sixty, in which time they probably traveled sixteen hundred miles in various directions, and at last sighted Formosa, an island of which they had never heard.

Almost dead from exhaustion, they landed and were kindly treated by the natives of that island. When they were able to eat and had regained their strength they were sent to Hongkong, thence to the Caroline Islands and from there home in a trading schooner. After more than three months' absence they were hailed by their friends as risen from the dead.

It is by such involuntary voyages, anthropologists think, that man was placed on many of the widely scattered islands.

Wild Men in Himalayas.
